MIKI IG HEADWAY AGAINST LEPROSY

LONDON, July 25—The "Indian Medical Gazette" contains a report by Captain T. Beauchamp Williams on his investigations into leprosy. Some of the Indian journals named Captain Williams' discoveries as a "cure" for the disease, and at the close of his report the bacteriologist refers to this. He says: "We have been treating a certain number of cases during the last eight months by vaccine methods. Our results are still in an experimental stage, and I am not by any means prepared to abide by our present vaccine as the best means of utilizing the organism. Still, by using our present vaccine, we have achieved, in the few cases treated, most interesting results. I do not put in photographs, as although two or three are very striking, I wish to lay stress on the fact, not on the amelioration of symptoms, but on its probable power of immunizing the patient against further spread of the disease."

"This brings me to the question of the results to be aimed at. Many people are disappointed when told that we claim no cases as cured. This point of view is very natural, but on consideration it will be seen that it is not a very helpful point of view in the treatment of such a chronic disease as leprosy. How can we expect very rapid and startling changes in lesions which have often taken years to reach their present size. At the same time, I will say that, given the co-operation of the patient, our actual positive results justify us in hoping that we can now effect a cure in early cases."

At present all that Captain Williams suggests to doctors is that they should simply assure themselves after continued treatment with the vaccine that they are controlling the disease and preventing fresh lesions occurring.

"This," he admits, "is not a very high standard, but it is more than we are able to do today by other methods of treatment, and it will prevent our method of treatment being given up too hastily, because

rapid and striking results are now achieved. In the meantime of this view I would suggest that as a regular routine measure, only weaker doses should be given about once a week, or, perhaps, once in ten days. By these remarks I do not wish to prevent anyone using larger doses and treating cases from a more individualistic standpoint. I only wish, by not setting too high a standard at present, to insure that we shall not suffer a set-back later on."

YARMOUTH TO CELEBRATE OLD HOME WEEK.

YARMOUTH, N. S., July 24—Yarmouth is decked out in holiday attire today, the opening day of the festivities attending Old Home week. The decorations, both in extent and beauty, far surpass any previous occasion. The streets are crowded with visitors, and everyone's pleasure bent. MUST MARRY OR PAY TAX.

PARIS, July 23—For the first time in France, a resolution in favor of a tax on bachelors was voted by the Lyons municipality yesterday afternoon. The council thus proposes to raise \$60,000 that it needs for the alleviation of the distress suffered by innumerable large families among the laboring classes in Italy. It is proposed to make all single men residing in Lyons liable to a tax of 32 and a supplementary tax tends to float a new company with a capital of \$5,000,000.

ANOTHER VICTIM OF THE PORCUPINE FIRE.

HALIFAX, July 24—Word has reached Halifax of the death of another Halifax County man, in the Porcupine fire. A dispatch states that the body of Osmond Butler, of Tangier, was found on Wednesday by searchers on the Egan mining property near Porcupine. Butler was missed, but it was thought he might have escaped. Death was due to suffocation.

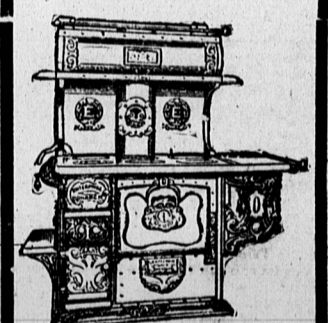
BLOODHOUNDS AID SEARCH FOR THE TRAINWRECKERS.

NEW YORK, July 25—Bloodhounds are aiding the detectives, who are searching Monday for the highwaymen who made the attempt to wreck a Long Island railroad train, near Valley Station, L. I., Sunday night. A 15 car passenger train loaded with pleasure seekers was speeding to the city when Engineer Whiteford saw an obstruction on the track. He threw on the brakes, reversed his engine and brought the train to a stop within fifteen feet of the obstruction. A tie had been planted in a hole between the rails and tilted toward the approaching engine. It had been firmly spiked down between two ties and then secured by ropes.

AN \$8,000,000 COMPANY.

LONDON, July 25—The Daily Mail learns that the Consolidated Gold Field Company of South Africa, under the advice, it says, of John Hays Hammond, has acquired considerable interest in the Yukon field and intends to float a new company with a capital of \$8,000,000.
