TORONTO WINS 4-3 VICTORY OVER RANGERS

MONTREAL, Nov. 12.—After a hard-checking game in which they came from behind to win, the Montreal Maroons today rested from their Saturday night labors during which they successfully inaugurated their 1933-34 National Hockey League season with a smart 3-2 victory over the Boston Bruins.
A crowd of 7,000 saw them bombard Tiny Thompson with a fusillade of shots, exchange bump for bump and then sweep through to a well-deserved triumph in their initial game.
Without the services of Eddie Shore who will report to President Frank Calder here on Monday, the Bruins were not quite up to standard but had sufficient power to punch two goals past Dave Kerr in the first two periods and then doggedly stem the speedy Maroon attacks.
"Eddie Shore will be here on Monday to see President Calder," was the terse statement of Art Ross, Bruins manager. Shore, the dynamic defenceman whose suspension for the coming to term with Bruins coming to terms with the Bruins was recently lifted by President Calder, left his Alberta farm near Edmonton on Friday night. Shore's absence seemed to disrupt the Boston machine but the Bruins waged a hard fight as they staved off the Maroons.
