Final Week Of Prayer Service At S'side

The final service of the week of prayer in Summerside was held on Friday evening at Trinity United Church. The pastor Rev. E.G. Sullivan presided and conducted the devotional part of the service. There was a very large congregation in attendance.

The sermon was delivered by the Rev. Charles Carney, pastor of the Summerside Free Wesleyan Church. His theme was "The Divided Church" and he summed up the meditations on the general theme of the week, "The Church in a Needy World". He chose as his text, "That they all may be one in us, that the world may know that thou has sent me".

In the course of a forceful address Mr. Carney said, "In the terrible world upheaval, now happily gradually subsiding, in presenting a solid front, a conquering front against a common foe, not one of the United Nations lost his own peculiar identity. Each had his own national practices and policies, although admittedly the diversity of these makes the marvel of their unity all the more surprising. Why should it be any different in the great common task to which the several communions of the church have set themselves? If the kingdom of God is to advance, we must be very careful on which foot we step forward. To emphasize the common task will be fatal. To awaken denominational jealousies and hatred would be to hand the victory to the enemy. By all means let us advance but let us advance together." -S.

Looking Ahead in Ottawa

By the Ottawa Staff of The Canadian Press OTTAWA, Jan. 13 (CP) - A campaign will be launched in Canada and the United States to restore the library of Caen University, shattered when Canadians fought the battle of the Falaise Gap in their drive through Normandy to the Rhine.

The campaign will be conducted by the "American Committee for the Library of Caen" formed less than a year ago under the chairmanship of Horatio Smith, professor of romance languages at Columbia University, New York. The Canadian section was formed after Prof. Smith approached Chief Justice Binfet of the Supreme Court of Canada last March for assistance and suggestions in the project.

The committee hopes to raise a total of 100,000 books and \$100,000 in Canada and the U.S. to re-stock the ruined Caen library. Ages: Amendments to the wartime wage control order now are in draft form and are expected to be put into effect within the next few weeks. The major changes likely will be relaxation of the present regulations, which require approval of War Labor Boards for all changes except those within an established range of rates, to allow free collective bargaining between employers and employees to operate in a limited range, possibly three or five per cent. The amendments also are expected to return to the provinces complete control over minimum wages which are in effect in essentially a provincial matter.

While a definite intention has been reached to relax wage control orders there is no evidence of any immediate intention to abandon it entirely as control of wages is considered an essential part of the Government's anti-inflation policy.

"Huff Duff" Secret Revealed By U. S.

BY WILLIAM GLOVER NEW YORK, Jan. 13 - (AP) - The United States Navy disclosed today the wartime secret of "huff duff," an electronic long-distance detection device which played a major part in winning the battle of the Atlantic.

Technically called high frequency direction finder (the initials HF-DF rapidly became "huff duff" in service slang) the electrical "finder" can spot a ship or plane half-way around the world. It was used as a team mate of radar and sound devices which spot objectives at a much shorter distance. The Navy told how the device on board ships, planes and in a network of shore stations succeeded in breaking up U-boat wolf packs before they could assemble and how work of shore stations succeeded in breaking up U-boat wolf packs before they could assemble and how landed saboteurs on the Long Island and Florida coasts in 1942 was located and sunk before it could escape.

The device picks up any voice or code radio signal transmitted on the international short-wave communications channels, and within
