PROBING DEATHS OF SCORE OF PERSONS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—The Chicago police today pursued their investigation into the deaths of nearly a score of relatives and acquaintances of Mrs. Louise Vermilya to make certain if the similar demises constituted only a removable series of coincidences as Mrs. Vermilya asserts. Nineteen deaths are included in the list with which Mrs. Vermilya's name has been connected, including two husbands, two step-children, three children and three roomers at boarding houses she kept. No positive evidence of crime has been uncovered.

The following new facts became known today: That while Mrs. Vermilya has said one of the death rosters, Richard Smith, a conductor, was only a boarder at her home, a former roomer asserts the two claimed previously to have been married and that they lived together as man and wife. That while the woman told the police she had assisted an undertaker at Crystal Lake, a former home, in embalming bodies, the undertaker there denies she ever had any such experience. She gave this as a reason why she could discuss the deaths with composure.

That R. N. Brington, a photographer of Peoria, and brother-in-law, of Conductor Smith, had made love to the widow following Smith's death, to investigate suspicion he then had of the reason for his relative's demise. That the widow had told him part of her matrimonial history, which he desires to give to the coroner. That Smith died during convulsions and after drinking some substance, but the doctors gave the cause of death, from descriptions of symptoms given by the widow, as acute gastritis.

A new coincidence developed today, following the sudden illness of Mrs. Vermilya herself, when a sister living in the house adjoining Mrs. Mary Buchholz suddenly became ill. Mrs. Vermilya told inquirers today she had never studied medicine, nor sought to become a nurse, as had been reported, but that she had some little knowledge of medicines that she had acquired to enable her to aid neighbors and relatives. She insisted she was innocent.

An exchange notes that the financial statement of the Government Railways of Canada for the year ending with March 31 has been issued. That for the Intercolonial shows the revenue to be \$9,591,070 and the working expenses \$9,531,070. It shows net earnings of \$60,000. The capital cost of the road and equipment is given as \$98,386,906. The length is 1,447 miles. The Prince Edward Island Railway in the year earned \$373,419. The operating expenses were \$424,104. The cost of working the road was \$86,684 greater than the revenue. The line is 267 1/2 miles in length, and is yet to be costed for traffic and equipment \$8,553,684.
