J. ALEXANDER MacLEOD

PICTOU, April 26 - The death occurred on Monday at his home on the Old Road, following a fall last Saturday night, of John Alexander MacLeod, a well-known resident of Pictou. He was born 73 years ago at New London, P. E. I., a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Donald MacLeod. At the age of four he came with his parents to Pictou where he had since lived. A noted horseman, he travelled extensively in his younger years over the United States and Canada attending horse shows and racing circuits. "Pacicle," as he was known to a wide circle of friends, will be remembered by many.

Beside his sister, Miss Annie MacLeod, with whom he made his home, Mr. MacLeod is survived by a brother in Toronto and by three sisters.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon, with Rev. A. F. MacKenzie officiating, and the choir of Pictou United church led in the singing of favorite hymns. The pall-bearers were J.
