The latest news, first of all.

Miss Freda Compton, Summerside, has returned home after a months visit to friends in Charlottetown.

A. Sinclair Ross, son of Dr. A. Ross, Alberton, has taken a position as junior in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Alberton.

The Farmers' Institute of Lots 27 28 held a very interesting session at Carleton on the 17th inst. In the absence of the Pres. the chair was very worthily filled by Vice Pres. Jos. Noonan who called the meeting to order at 3 p. m. Sec. read a circular from the Commissioner of Agriculture re "Pork Industry" which was discussed by W. S. Muttart, William Carruthers, Vice Pres. Noonan, Robert Carruthers, George McMicken, Albert Muttart and John Crockett. The following are the questions asked in the circular and the answers thereto, as decided by this meeting. First, Do you consider the production of pork profitable? Yes. Second, Would you prefer to sell hogs alive? Not according to our past experience. Third, What would you consider a fair price for hogs compared with dead? About 1 cent per lb less for live hogs when well fattened. Fourth, Is it possible to supply a larger per cent of hogs during the summer months. Not with profit to the farmer. Fifth, At what weight do you consider a finished hog most profitable? From 200 to 250 lbs dressed weight. Evening Session. A circular re "Noxious Weeds" was read by the Soc. and

discussed by Albert Muttart, Vice Pres. Noonan, W. S. Muttart, George McMicken and S. Carruthers. The questions asked and the answers to the same are—First, What method do you consider the best to take to eradicate the most objectionable weeds? Pulling or cutting to prevent seeding where not very numerous and a shorter rotation of crops. Second, It is considered that the following are the most objectionable. Ragwort, Yarrow or Wild Tansy, Hawkweed or Devils Pat. In the opinion of your Institute should Legislation be introduced to compel the owners to eradicate the above weeds growing on their farms, also to provide for the removal of same from the Public Highways? Yes. An interesting talk on "Our most profitable farm stock" was participated in by W. S. Muttart, T. B. Gillespie, A. Muttart, Vice Pres. Noonan, Hedley Muttart, S. Carruthers, Henry Lowther and Patrick Muncey. After a very lively debate on this subject the following was resolved—Resolved that in the opinion of this meeting the most profitable branch of our farm stock is that in which the individual farmer is the most interested. Reference was made by the Sec. to the Seed Fair to be held in Summerside next month and the hope was expressed by our Vice Pres. that we would all be there. (J. E. H.)

Some curious combinations were made in the voting at the civic election at Summerside on Tuesday last. There were six hundred and sixteen votes cast of which seven were spoilt.
