NEW BURGLAR ALARM

How an Automobile May be Used for The Purpose

One of the surest and best sorts of burglar alarms can be fashioned in the home with no further appliances than a high powered well equipped automobile.

This simple device is recommended by a Chicago motorist who tried it with the best sort of success. There are a lot of people who might have difficulty in procuring the automobile, but those who have one can try it.

There are few people who are greater sufferers from petty thievery than motorists who keep their cars in private garages. There are so many little expensive things about an auto that are easily detached that they seem to attract thieves and as a result the garage set away off from the house becomes a favorite place for the light fingered fraternity to ply their trade.

The Chicago man who invented this preventive suffered in silence for a long time and then he provided a safe and sure relief by simply connecting his electric motor horn and headlights with the garage doors just as an ordinary burglar alarm is connected.

The result was that when Mr. Burglar opened the door the headlights flashed out and the horn started a rasping, deafening roar that continued until someone came from the house and closed the doors again. The noise was so sudden and so startling that the first burglar who started it was frightened off immediately and it was so loud and continuous that it aroused the entire neighborhood.

Cure for Balky Horse

Want to know how to start a balky horse? That sounds like a foolish question and it has been echoed through all the ages since horses came into general use.

Everybody who owns one would like to know how to start a balky horse. Here's a way that has never failed. Take an ordinary bamboo fish pole long enough to reach the head of the horse from the carriage seat. Attach a round wooden bolt crossways to the end of the rod and fasten copper rivet heads in each end of the bolt.

Then attach the two wires of an electric battery, one to each rivet head and let them run along the pole to the handle where they will be fastened to ordinary binding posts. Run wires from your battery, under the carriage seat, to the handle of the pole. When the horse balks turn on your current and touch the horse behind the ears with the rivet heads. He'll move—no matter how determined he has been not to do so.

Venomous Snake Admitted to the London Zoo

A new resident has arrived at the London Zoo. He is a snake of the most venomous kind, and goes by the name of Bushmaster. He has a big, ugly head and a beautiful body, but just at present he is very sleepy, because he wants to change his skin. This is not the first specimen of the kind that has been in Regent's Park, but the new arrival is the finest that has ever come to this country. He has not shown his peculiar temper yet, but the keepers are dealing with him warily, for he has an exceedingly bad character. His birthplace was Trinidad, in the West Indies, and he is supposed to be one of the quickest moving of all snakes, as well as the worst tempered. Lachesis (for that is his scientific name) lives in swamps, plantations and forests, both on plains and on hills, and his females are ridiculously prolific. The young are produced by dozens at a time. They are ten inches long at birth, and are brought into the world in a state of viciousness equal to that of their parents.
