AN IMPRESSIVE CONSECRATION

Dr. Richardson of St. John Consecrated a Coadjutor Bishop of Fredericton by the Acting Metropolitan at Montreal - Imposing Array of Church Dignitaries

MONTREAL, Nov. 30. (Special) - The Bishop of Toronto, Rt. Rev. Dr. Sweetman, performed his first act of the consecration of a Bishop today at Christ Church Cathedral in his capacity as acting Metropolitan of the Church of England in succession to the late Archbishop Bond.

Bishop of the Canadian House of Bishops, had as his attendants: Chaplains Rev. Canon Baylis and Rev. A. J. Doull. He was accompanied by the crozier and all the insignia of Archiepiscopal authority.

EMPRESS OF IRELAND DETAINED SEVEN HOURS

Time Lost By Sending Mails to Halifax Is Reported to Have Caused Delay of a Day - Waited Seven Hours At Halifax.

MONTREAL, Dec. 1. (Special) - The S. S. Empress of Ireland was detained 7 hours on Saturday at Halifax, awaiting the Canadian mails which were despatched over the I. C. R. from here on Friday at noon. Had the special C. P. R. steamship ex-

press, which left Montreal late on Thursday last, been utilized for the Canadian mails and the Empress sailed direct from St. John to Liverpool, a day would have been gained in the distribution of these mails in Great Britain.

PARLIAMENT LEFT WITH LITTLE TO DO

Probability of an early Adjournment to Allow Members to Consult with Constituents - Unless the Insurance Commission Arrives Upon the Scene at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Dec. 1. (Special) - The Budget debate having concluded in such an unexpectedly short time, parliament is left with but little business on hand and an adjournment will probably be made at an

early date for the holidays, to allow members a chance to consult with their constituents about tariff. The only thing that will hold members at the capital will be the early arrival of the Insurance Commission.

A CANADIAN FOR AN AMBASSADOR

London Daily Mail Considers Appointment Would Be A Wise Course

LONDON, Nov. 30. - The Daily Mail this morning takes up the agitation for the appointment of a Canadian as Ambassador at Washington in succession to Sir Mortimer Durand. In an editorial the paper says: "It would be a wise course if the Government is anxious to consolidate the Empire, Canada had suffered in the past through the ignorance or shortcomings of British diplomats; witness the Ashburton Treaty of 1842 (as to the boundary line between Maine and Canada) and the Oregon agreement of 1846 (a territorial dispute between Great Britain and the United States) which was settled by treaty, and the Alaska boundary a litigation.

NEW DEPARTURE IN BUSINESS

Store For Negroes - Colored Folks buy Block For a Departmental Store

NEW YORK, Dec. 1. - The building at the north-east corner of Eighth avenue and Forty-sixth street has been brought by a corporation controlled by negroes, which will open a department store there for colored people. A banking institution will be established in connection with the enterprise.

COFFEE HOUSE TO RIVAL SALOONS

Christian Workers Establish Resort to Attract Men from Drinking Houses

DENVER, Nov. 30. - A coffee house - a place of welcome for men, in competition with the welcome offered him by the down-town saloon - is soon to be launched somewhere on the lower street of Denver, either under the auspices of the Christian Citizenship Union, Christian Endeavor Union and may be both. Coffee houses have been established by the Christian Endeavor Union in many cities. They are places of warmth and comfort, with the lights burning at nearly all hours and there are always ready a cup of hot coffee, a sandwich and a late magazine. These are places where men can meet their fellows for sociability when the lights in the churches are out.

MAN IN TRANCE NEARLY BURIED

Suddenly Awakes When All Preparations to Bury Him Have Been Made.

MOOSE JAW, Sask., Nov. 30. - On Sunday night, John Buchanan was reported to have been found dead in bed. No inquest was deemed necessary. After all preparations were made for his funeral he suddenly awakened from a trance this morning. Time is prevented being buried alive. His condition, however, is so precarious that little hope is entertained for his recovery.

MONCTON FIRE IN GLEE CLUB ROOM

Hurried Escape Of Fifteen Members Fortunately Without Serious Injury

MONCTON, Dec. 2. (Special) - Twelve or fifteen members of the Apollo Glee Club, the rooms of which are on the third floor of the Minto sample rooms building, were caught this afternoon by a fire, which originated on the first floor around the furnace pipe. The building was densely filled with smoke when the fire was discovered by one of the club members, and the others were obliged to grope their way down two flights to exit below, all getting out safely, though with great difficulty. The fire was extinguished without doing much damage. The Spencer cup, emblematic of the Hockey Championship of N. B., and other athletic trophies in the room were brought out in case the building should be destroyed.

HUNTING IS AS DANGEROUS AS WAR

The Number of Fatalities That Have Occurred in New England States During Moose Season - Two of The Victims Were A Woman

BOSTON, Dec. 2. (Special) - With the close season on moose going into effect in Maine at midnight last night, statistics completed today show that the two months of the hunting season in New England have cost nineteen hundred lives. Of these fatalities eight occurred in Maine, six in Massachusetts, three in New Hampshire and two in Vermont. Four deaths occurred from exposure and

one from an attack of heart disease while the other fourteen were cases of fatal shooting. Only one instance was self inflicted, thus leaving thirteen hunters at the close of the season each responsible for human life. Two of the victims were women. In addition at least 15 others have been seriously injured by accidental discharge of hunters' weapons.

WHERE PEOPLE LIVE LONG TIME

Balkan Peninsula Has More Centenarians Than Any Other Part of World

BERLIN, November 30. - A German statistician has made a careful investigation to discover in which countries the greatest age is attained. The result shows that the German Empire, with fifty-five million population, has but 78 persons who are more than 100 years old. France, with a population of over 40 millions, has 213 who have passed their 100th birthday. England has 146; Scotland, 40; Denmark, 2; Belgium, 3; Sweden, 10; and Norway, with 2 million inhabitants, 83. Switzerland does not boast of a single centenarian, but Spain, with about 18 million people, has 410. The most amazing figures come from the iron-belted, turbulent region of the Balkan peninsula. Serbia has 573 persons, who are more than 100 years old. Rumania has 1,094, and Bulgaria 3,383. In other words Bulgaria has a centenarian for every thousand of its inhabitants, and thus holds the international record for the oldest people. In 1892 alone, there died in Bulgaria 350 persons who had lived more than a century.

INDIAN OPINION OF SIKH INVASION

Serious View Taken of the Way Hindus Are Treated In B.C.

LONDON, Nov. 30. - Anglo-Indians are inclined to take a serious view of the consequences of the invasion of British Columbia by Sikhs. Recent inquiries here indicate that the India Council here are advisers of John Morley as Secretary of state, have no knowledge of the invasion, though it is not doubted the Indian government could on the initiative of the India Council stop emigration by representing to the Intending emigrants the unfitness of British Columbia to their settlement in view of the fundamental difference in their social and religious habits. Anglo-Indians agree that these Sikhs are magnificent men. Many have fought valourously for the Empire, and would be admirably suited for small farming of the character proposed in the newly irrigated Canadian Pacific lands east of the Rockies, but they are a most sensitive people, especially proud of their citizenship in the Empire, and the Empire of the British Columbians who do not understand them, must have the worst possible effect upon Indian opinion.

FOREIGN COAL FOR N.S. STEEL CO.

First Cargo Arrived from Philadelphia Saturday - Second Blast Furnace Blown In

ROLLING STOCK FOR THE C.P.R.

MONTREAL, Nov. 30. - It is stated today that rolling stock to the value of \$13,000,000 is now under consideration by the Canadian Pacific. Mr. Boyer will probably be chairman at a salary of \$8,000, while his colleagues will receive \$5,000 each.
