POWNA.—The third meeting of the Quarterly Official Board of the Pownal Circuit was held on Wednesday at the home of Mrs. H. Lane, Mount Mellick. Rev. E. E. Styles presided. There was a good attendance. The financial report, presented by H. Jenkins, Recording Steward, was very encouraging, showing a substantial improvement as compared with the corresponding quarter of last year. The sum of \$20 is still needed to complete the special Connectional Funds for the year. With the exception of the Parsonage, all the trusts in the circuit have paid their way up-to-date. The pastor expressed his appreciation of the loyal and harmonious co-operation of the members of the board with him and with each other. He also congratulated the board on having a record steward whose figures are always reliable. The board then adjourned until the third week in May.

Besides a large circle of relatives and friends, two sons and two daughters are left to mourn, viz Samuel and Mrs. Walter Stetson of Freetown, Wallace at Springfield, Lot 67, and Bessie at home; also two sisters Mrs. James Stetson of O'Leary and Mrs. M. McLean of Brookfield. His last words to his daughter who stood by his bedside were "I hope we will meet in Heaven." The funeral service, which was very largely attended, was conducted by his pastor Rev. Mr. Morris at the house and grave. He was laid to rest beside his wife who predeceased him some two years ago.
