PUBLICITY CAMPAIGN CONSIDERED—At a council meeting of the St. John Board of Trade on Thursday last the matter of a Dominion wide publicity campaign to encourage greater consumption of potatoes came up for discussion. It will be remembered that Mr. J. O. Hyndman, in a recent letter published in the Guardian, outlined the need and purpose of such a campaign and that considerable interest was aroused by the suggestion. Mr. Hyndman has since been in communication with the Federal Department of Trade and Commerce and others and the proposal is meeting with very favorable consideration. The St. John Board has been asked to co-operate with Prince Edward Island in the putting on of such a campaign and the proposal was endorsed at Thursday's meeting. It is probable that the subject will be brought up at the next annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade, which will be held in Halifax Nov. 21st, and in the meantime in view of the present surplus of potatoes, it is expected that growers and others especially interested will give hearty co-operation to the suggestion.

no means perfect as any one who reads his life may easily recognize. He may be perfect now, I do not know, but one thing is certain that if he be perfect now, that perfection is due to the sovereignty of the Good whom he served, and not to any merits of his own. With all his earthly imperfections he inspired admiration as well as admiration, and in the long list of our sea-kings Nelson towers head and shoulders above them all. For twenty-six months before the battle of Trafalgar he never set foot on land. He hunted the enemy's fleet from Malta to the mouths of the Orinoco and back again to Europe. This he did with the relentless and untiring ferocity of a sleuth-hound, and during all that time he was brilliantly single-minded, unselfish and unswerving. Russia again is clamouring that unless she is invited to sign the Peace Pact the agreement reached may be framed against her and so must take steps to resist it. We must be blind to the movements of history if we fail to recognize these things which point the index finger to the fact that the time has not yet come when spears shall be turned into pruning hooks, or swords into ploughshares. We will preserve a wiser policy if we prepare ourselves for an eventual and inevitable struggle to our hand. We shall find how true the words are which I select for this service upon Trafalgar day: "We have done that which was our duty to do."

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David Goldstein to Lecture Here

Charlottetown Council, Knights of Columbus has invited David Goldstein, of Boston, to deliver a free public lecture, on Sunday evening, Oct. 28 at 8.30 o'clock. His subject will be "What is Wrong With the Family?" Mr. Goldstein's visit to Charlottetown is part of the Knights of Columbus nation-wide campaign against the insidious propaganda that constitutes a serious menace to Christian ideals of family life and which has, in recent months, come forward with a new boldness. Mr. Goldstein, nationally known authority on sociological questions, will deal with the Christian, the evolutionary, the socialist and the modernistic conception of the family, the moral character and the responsibility of the family and its relation to the state. He will review the assaults upon the family in Russia, Mexico, the United States and Canada, treating especially of the disruptive work of writers and lecturers now in public prominence. Mr. Goldstein's address will challenge the views of Judge Ben Lindsey of Colorado and Bertrand Russell of England and others who have been touring the United States and Canada in the interest of anti-religious and unscientific concepts of the origin of the family and domestic relations. Mr. Goldstein's work upon the public platform has been highly commended. The Toronto Globe said: "In the development of his theme—'What is Wrong With the Family' he harried every stronghold of the radicals on this continent."

THE MARKETS
MONTREAL, Oct. 21.—The export trade in grain here Saturday was extremely dull but a moderate amount of business was done with local buyers in the domestic cash grain market. Prices were steady. The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was fair and prices were firm. A feature of the mill feed trade was the stronger feeling that developed for bran and shorts and prices were advanced one dollar per ton. This was attributed to the limited supplies available and the good demand. Prices for middlings unchanged. The inquiry for standard grades of rolled oats showed a slight improvement and a moderate trade was done at steady prices. Despite an inactive demand the tone of the butter market was steady. Receipts on Saturday were 1,862 packages. The undertone to the cheese market was easier owing to the limited quantity from all sources. Receipts were 8,525 boxes. The demand for all grades of eggs continued good and values were firm. Receipts were 867 cases. Imported beans were unchanged with a small trade. Receipts in choice white handpicked grades at \$4.50 to \$4.60 per bushel, ex store. Potatoes were in good demand. New Brunswick green mountain sold at 70c per bag of 90 lbs. in bulk ex track while Prince Edward Island white, (made "A" changed hands at the decreased price of 80c per bag ex-track. Montreal, Quebec white sold in bulk at sixty and sixty five cents ex-track.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 21.—Supplies of fresh eggs are decreasing and the market on this grade continued firm.

MONTREAL—Supplies of fresh eggs, particularly extras, are now becoming quite scarce here. Prices to grocers for the coming week have been advanced to extras 60c; firsts 50c; seconds 40c.

CALGARY—The local egg market is steady. Returns to country shippers have increased. Eggs are averaging extras 43c; firsts 34c; seconds 27c. Pullet extras are costing 38c F O B and are jobbing here at 43 1-2c. Storage stocks are moving better and are selling to retailers at extras 42c; firsts 39c; seconds 35c.

VICTORIA—The egg market here continues to advance. At the present time dealers are quoting prices for ungraded eggs, delivered, extras 48c; firsts 45 1-2c; pullet extras 36c. Receipts are not sufficient to meet the local demand.
