The Star's criticism of the Taschereau administration is the more striking in as much as this newspaper cannot be accused of having been over partial to the Conservative party.

It says: "The Conservative rank-and-file in Compton County, storming the interested advice given them from local Conservative sources to go to the polls and vote for the Taschereau-Perron candidate to be elected by acclamation, have taken the bit between their teeth and put it in the mouth of the Labrador candidate in the field. In its initiation, the Compton election is emphatically 'a soldier's battle.' The Conservative voters of Quebec clearly have tired of hearing 'the retreat' sounded whenever an entrenched Liberal Government threw down the gauntlet. They have decided, so far as Compton County is concerned, that the time has come to fight, even if it be 'with their backs to the wall.'"
