CONSCIENCE STRICKEN PERSON SENDS \$180.

OTTAWA, January 29.—The customs department received today the sum of \$180 conscious money from Montreal. While occasionally small sums, ranging in the vicinity of one or two dollars, are received, the present contribution from Montreal is the largest received for some time. Some time ago a remarkable parcel was received in the department. It was wrapped in brown paper, tied loosely with a piece of string and bore the Ottawa postmark. Examination revealed sixteen fifty dollar bills—a total of \$800. This money was evidently brought to Ottawa and sent in to the department in this way. As, of course, the senders of these amounts never volunteer their names, the department acknowledges thru the medium of the press the receipt thereof.

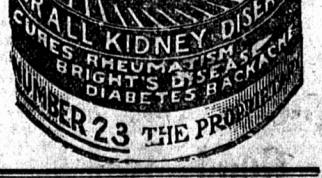
