This is the second death in this family in about two weeks, Scott, the youngest son of disease having succumbed to the same disease after but a few days illness. Besides a widow, the bereaved family, who will have the sincere sympathy of a large circle of friends, includes two sons, Frank, in R. T. Holman's store, Summerside, and Charles at home; and six daughters Mrs. Bowness, Norboro; Mrs. Atwood, New Bedford, Mass; Mrs. Joseph Lewis, Summerside; Mrs. Judson Burns, Freetown; Mrs. Bert Craig, Freetown; Mrs. Jardine, Kensington. Deceased was 70 years of age.

WHILE in Summerside yesterday afternoon, George Wright, Searletown, received a telegram announcing the death of his brother J. Marshall Wright, formerly of Searletown, which occurred the previous evening at Verdun, Manitoba. Deceased had been ill for some months and death came not unexpected. The late Mr. Wright went to Manitoba about two years ago and last August his wife and family joined him in the West. His farm property at Searletown was sold by auction on Monday, the day of his death. Deceased was a son of the late Robert Wright of Searletown and was 54 years of age, an earnest Christian gentleman, a devout member of the Searletown Methodist Church and highly esteemed by all who knew him. Left to mourn are a widow, three sons and two daughters. Three brothers also survive him, namely Charles of Cape Traverse; Wesley and George of Searletown; and one sister Mrs. Prince Leard of Searletown.

The market yesterday was not very largely attended.

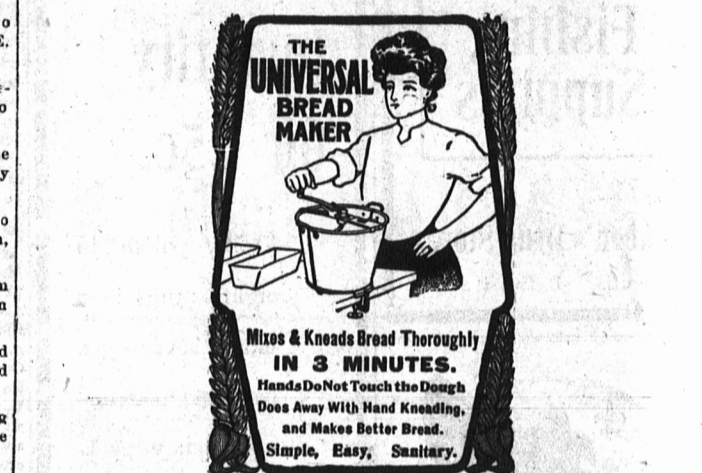
Potatoes brought 35 cents a bushel and turnips 20 cents.
