LAST OPPORTUNITY TO HEAR TALKIES

Cardin To Probe Fishing Affairs In Maritimes

MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES WILL ARRIVE IN CHARLOTTETOWN ON THE 23RD INSTANT

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—Hon. P. J. Cardin, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, will leave Ottawa next Wednesday afternoon for an extensive tour of the fishing districts of Nova Scotia. The trip which is designed to enable him to come into contact with the fishermen and their problems, and also with those engaged in the different branches of the fishing industry, will carry him to Prince Edward Island, the Magdalen Islands, and also to the Cape Peninsula. It is not a speaking tour, but the Minister states that he will hear any representations that those engaged in or interested in the fishing industry wish to present.

He will be accompanied by W.A. Found, Deputy Minister of Fisheries. Hon. J.L. Ralston, Minister of National Defence, will accompany Mr. Cardin on his tour through Nova Scotia. It is expected that following this trip, the question of regulations will be considered.

As to consolidation of rural schools, I have never seen the project working, that is, I do not know by experience how it succeeds or otherwise, but should you experience country roads in winter and spring, should you plunge through snowbanks when it was impossible for a team to go, or should you break a nice track all by yourself on a country road, while the ratepayers were probably just waking up properly, and would be thoroughly awake by noon, when you would be overjoyed to see the road "broken," then you have one point to consider. Another is, would accommodation permit of consolidation? Still other points: the very fact two or more rural schools were consolidated would necessitate the very centre I wish would be created, and then again little tots five and six years, or even seven, would be put to a great deal of hardship. Winter mornings are very short, also the evenings, and very cold, too. But I do think where there are ten or twelve pupils or less, the matter should be given consideration, both from the efficiency and financial standpoint. From the efficiency side, because we could retain better teachers with better training by spending the amount now expended on those schools on the remaining ones, and from a financial point, because in a district of ten pupils, for example, or twelve, the minimum rate of cost of tuition per school year for each individual pupil is from \$50 to \$65 or \$70, a rather high rate, where better results would be obtained otherwise. A great many graded centres now created could be used if Grade IX and X were abolished in one room rural schools, and in the event of the creation of a new centre, it would serve from about eight to ten one room rural school districts.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 6.—There were 256 cattle, 351 calves, 1098 hogs and 388 sheep and lambs for sale on two markets including 56 cattle, 132 calves and 134 sheep and lambs held over from yesterday's market. The cattle market was steady. Common to medium cows brought from \$4.50 to \$6.50 and bulls were from \$5 to \$6. A couple of loads of common state steers were sold for \$8.00 and \$8.50. Calves were steady at \$11.00 to \$13.00 for good veals and common calves were from \$6 to \$8.00. The sheep market was steady. Good lambs brought \$12.00 and \$12.50, common kinds were moving slowly and were not wanted. Sheep were from \$4.00 to \$6.00. Hogs were steady to strong according to yesterday's close. Good quality hogs were sold for \$14.50 fed and watered flat, with a few small sales at \$14.60. Mixed lots including an odd heavy hog and sow brought \$13.75 to \$14.00. Sows were from \$12 to \$13.
