Carnival—Friday, Jan. 29th.

Stock Notes:—Charles Carter, a well-known stockman of Winsloe North, is the owner of a sow that for prolificness can not probably be excelled if equalled in the Province. Within a year this specimen has had three litters as follows: Jan. 10th, 1903—18; July 6th, 1903—20; Dec. 22nd, 1903—13; a total of 49 live pigs. Out of these 46 pigs, 38 lived and were fattened for the market. Who can beat this?

Over sixty of the Canadians mentioned are professors in leading American Colleges; a large number are journalists.
