FOUR ST. JOHN MEN INJURED IN EXPLOSION

Two Are in a Serious Condition As Gasoline on Boat Explodes.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 10.—Four men were injured, two severely, by an explosion of gasoline on board the motorboat Salucan III at her wharf here this afternoon. Fire gutted the boat, used by Dr. H. B. Reed to meet incoming ships at Partridge Island for inspection. The injured were rushed to hospital.

Severely Burned

O. E. Heans, engineer of the Salucan, was severely burned about the face, head, hands and feet. No bones were broken.

Thrown Onto Wharf

The force of the explosion threw Heans clear of the boat and onto the wharf where the craft was tied. Captain Kinghorn and Johnson made their way from the boat without aid.

Many Proposals Before Dominion Cabinet Council

OTTAWA, Nov. 10.—(C.P.)—Although Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and most of his Ministers were in their offices throughout the week, no formal meetings of the Cabinet Council have been held since last Saturday, and none will be called until next Monday morning. This is somewhat of a precedent as such sessions are usually held several times a week, and daily during the session of Parliament.

Armistice Silence

His Honour the Lieutenant Governor has received the following telegram from the Secretary of State, Ottawa:

I have the honour to inform your Honour that His Majesty the King has approved of arrangements whereby Two Minutes Silence will be observed throughout the British Commonwealth at eleven o'clock in the forenoon of Remembrance Day, November Eleventh, and accordingly Dominion, Provincial and Municipal authorities are asked to arrange for the suspension of all vehicular traffic during those two minutes. Your Government is respectfully requested to make public His Majesty's approval of this arrangement.
