His many friends on the Island will regret to learn that R. Hensley Staveland, Wilnot who is now studying at Pine Hill was compelled to undergo an operation last week. He will be in the Hospital for several weeks yet though recovering rapidly.

A FEELING of sadness was cast over the community of Margate, when on Sunday morning April 26th it was announced that Master Harold A. McKay only son of the late Captain Rollo McKay, had passed away at the early age of thirteen years, and after an illness of ten days of the grippe. Only five weeks previous his mother, Mrs. David H. Auld Covehead was buried, after which he went to live with his uncle John Webster, Norboro, and from there the funeral took place to the family plot in the cemetery at Central Bedouque. He had lived for some time with his uncle Thos. R. Tuplin Margate prior to his mother's sickness and death, and endeared himself to both old and young. While there he was a member of the Sunday School and the Sunbeam Mission Band where his winning ways will long be remembered. Too much cannot be said of Harold and his pleasant smile and cheerful disposition will be missed by many, as was evidenced by the large number of people who assembled to pay their last tribute of respect, and by the floral gifts from sympathizing friends. The pall bearers were, Joe Webster, Geo. Howness, Offie Inman, Harry Hughes, Frank Webster, and Ralph Rogers. He leaves to mourn one sister Miss Irene, younger than himself, besides a large number of relatives and friends.

EASTERN NOTES.—The weather keeps cold and season backward and May has been ushered in by a storm of unusual severity. The roads are fairly good with the exception of a few steep hills where a large quantity of snow had accumulated. Cod-fish struck off West River on the 24th April, two days later than last year which was the earliest for forty years. Some fair catches have been made there when the weather is calm enough for fishing, while farther west off Basin Head and Red Point, those old time fishing grounds, but little has been done. The furious southerly gale of 1st May destroyed many of the nets on the south side, a matter which will seriously interfere with the bait supply, and bait is an essential factor in the present trawling system. The changeable weather causes an epidemic of colds, especially among children here at present, and causes an era of discomfort among the bloods, who have to wear light garments on one day and fur coats the next, fitting emblem of the "lady of the snows."—John Hugh McDonald of Red Point died on the evening of the 30th April after a protracted illness. He was born at Chepstow some sixty-seven years ago. His wife preceeded him nine years ago. Four of his brothers were drowned and the one survivor, John C., is now in Gloucester, Mass., having left his brother a few weeks ago where he spent the winter. His many eastern friends sincerely regret the demise of Malcolm S. McCleod of Uigg. 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REPORT OF DISTRICT NURSE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee of January last appointed on District Nurse begs to report that the Trustees of the P. E. I. Hospital appointed three of their members to confer with said committee and the Matron providing a District Nurse for the City of Charlottetown. After some discussion it was decided that an extra nurse be given to the Training School of the Hospital for one year, her board to be given by the trustees, and that the Ladies Aid Society be asked to donate \$100 for her salary.

At the next meeting of the Society this amount was granted and your committee was appointed to take charge of all arrangements for this Nurse for the year. Dr. Taylor has volunteered \$25 for extra expenses for the year to be paid quarterly into the Ladies Aid, the first instalment of which has been paid to the Treasurer. The sum of \$7.25 has also been handed to Miss Lowden part proceeds of Mr. Gardiner's lecture in Bejeque. This is also for extras for the District Nurse.

Your Committee decided to solicit the charitable societies from each church for contributions towards a box of plain bedding, underclothing etc., for the Nurse's use in destitute cases, these things only to be loaned to the patients. This request was generously responded to and a box with necessary equipments will be placed in the Hospital in care of the District Nurse. A circular letter has been sent to each Doctor in the city, notifying each of the appointment of the Nurse from May 1st, when the Matron has promised to try and be prepared for all calls upon her. The scale of fees is, one dollar for attendance at an obstetric case, fifty cents for attendance at an operation, and twenty-five cents an hour for ordinary visits. When patients are very poor or destitute they pay what they can, or no fee is asked. These arrangements are not to interfere in any way with graduated nurses, but are intended to supply a long felt want for those who may not have ways and means to employ the regular trained nurse.

The Faithful Circle of King's Daughters, whose primary work is in connection with this Hospital has kindly donated \$20 to be spent at the discretion of the committee. We also have to thank R.becca Lodge for a kind donation of \$5. The greater part of this money has already been expended on the Nurse's outfit items of which will appear in our yearly report.

We also desire to thank W. A. Weeks & Co., for a handsome leather bag, which will prove a valuable addition to the outfit.
