BRIEF NOTES FROM FASHION'S REALM

It is predicted that silks will be more fashionable than ever this Fall.

A charming parasol is covered with five one-inch ruffles of taffeta, with pinked edges.

A small round hat with an extension brim of tulle has two long quills posed on the extreme brim edge.

There is now a washable tulle, or net, which can stand going through the laundry almost as well as muslin.

Separate sashes worn with lingerie gowns are made of ribbon, bordered with flowers and bowknots formed of narrow taffeta ribbon.

Crepe de chine, Canton crepes and charmeuse will be popular for street

dresses this Fall, according to the New York importers.

In a ridsummer model of white crepe de chine printed with futuristic flowers a short loop and a tasselled sash end are amusingly placed.

Ratine, creponne, linen, crash and other washable fabrics have fulfilled the predictions of early spring that they would be among the popular handbag materials.

Many of the midsommer hats are being trimmed with ribbons of velvet which hang in streamers down the back as far as the waist. All colors are used, but black is the most popular.

Soft silks of all kinds are generally accepted for street costumes. These materials are made up on the strict, severe lines of the tailored suit, the skirts being arranged to give grace to the wearer.

Among the novelties promised for the Fall is brocade moire, which is moire cloth with brocade satin floral figures in old French designs. In the heavier materials velvets, chin-chillas, flushes and velours de laine will be worn.

At a fashionable wedding in London recently, the bride's gown was made of the richest white satin charmeuse, trimmed with beautiful Limerick lace, and it had a girdle of jewelled silver gauze with long crystal and pearl tassels.

Stockings should match the color of the gown with which they are worn. And black shoes may be worn with hose of any color. Black colonial slippers and white stockings are frequently worn with lingerie frocks. Blue stockings and blue shoes are to be seen with white dresses and blue sashes.

For afternoon wear, white gloves are heavily embroidered with black. Embroidered or shirred arms are seen on some of the finest silk gloves. Very smart are the white gloves stitched with red. Lisle gloves are considered the best for all-round use in hot weather.

The wrist is almost taken the place of the strap on the modish handbags. Ribbons appear on leather bags as well as on silk ones. They are certainly more in keeping with the hot weather, and they can easily be renewed when too frequent use wears them threadbare.

For summer holiday wear nothing is more delightful than Shantung silk, whether in the form of coat and skirt costumes or travelling wraps. The color of the fabric is invariably becoming, while it is equally attractive on account of its dust-resisting qualities. A Shantung coat of smart design is trimmed effectively with groups of buttons and finished with a roll collar and cuffs of ponge in some contrasting shade.

An attractive frock combining various summer materials has a foundation of crepe de chine, green color, with a front forming a rather tight overskirt of very fine embroidered net. The corsage is made half of net, half of mousseline—in the same

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tone—with cuffs and a finish about the low, round neck of black tulle illusion in the form of a Pierrot, as the plaited flat collar is called.

Dainty, coquettish Watteau hats are to be seen in Paris, simply trimmed with a bow of satin ribbon, and a posy of old-time flowers, while other hats of the Niniche category are tied with velvet ribbons and trimmed with huge bows of tulle or bunches of Nattier flowers.

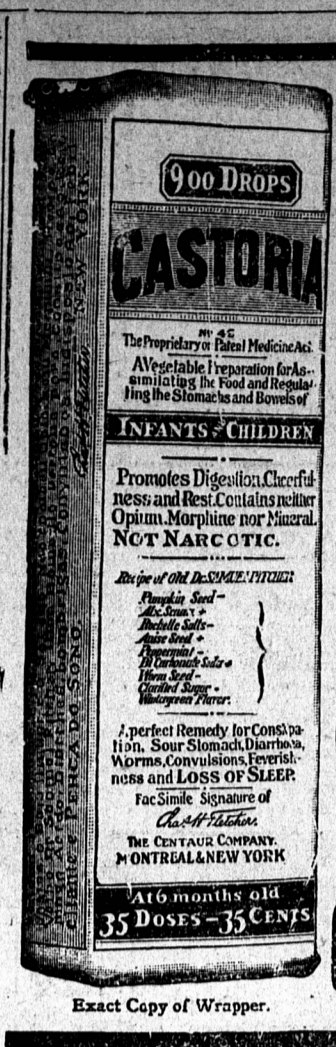
THE BODY FOUND AFTER THIRTEEN YEARS.
