Ball Players Elected To Hall Of Fame

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (AP)—Four players—pitchers Carl Hubbell and Lefty Grove, second baseman Frankie Frisch and catcher Mickey Cochrane—have been elected to baseball's hall of fame by the Baseball Writers' Association of America, it was announced tonight.

The poll was completed Jan. 15 and included votes of 161 members of the Baseball Writers' Association. It was the first time since Rogers Hornsby was elected in 1942 that any player received 75 per cent of the votes received before a player is named to the game's national shrine.

Balloting was restricted to writers who have been members of the association for 10 years or more and the voting was confined to players who were active in 1921 and had completed their careers before 1946. Only Hubbell, Frisch, Cochrane and Grove were nominated on the requisite 121 ballots of the 161 cast.
