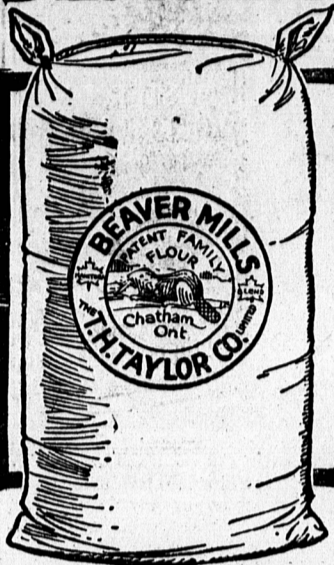

\$2,000 Per Day Profit In Duty
 WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Senator John Wm. Harrell of Oklahoma, was charged from the floor of the Senate today with a personal financial interest in the success or failure of an amendment to the Tariff Bill which had been adopted by the Senate, would have imposed a duty of 35 cents a barrel on refined and 25 cents a barrel on crude petroleum. The amendment was introduced by Senator Harrell, and he was one of the nine Senators who voted for it.
 Senator Heflin of Alabama charged that Senator Harrell is part owner of an Oklahoma well known as "Homa," the output of which he said is 8,000 barrels a day and the proposed duty meant, added the Alabama Senator, 25 cents on each of those 8,000 barrels or \$2,000 a day out "of the pockets of the public."
 Senator Harrell admitted that he was interested in oil, but said that his profits would be "insignificant" when compared with the profits of the public if the proposed tax was approved. He argued that the tax would mean new life for numerous small wells which, he declared, face des-

truction because of non-protection.
POLICEMAN SHOT BY BOOTLEG GANG
 NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—In a pistol fight with bootleggers at Tenth avenue and Thirty-first street, Probationary Policeman, Frances O'Neill, of Chief Inspector Lahey's staff, received a bullet that will keep him from duty for several weeks.
 O'Neill single-handed, attacked four armed bootleggers and kept up the fight until he dropped to the pavement unconscious. The bootleggers sped away in an automobile.
 O'Neill noticed the automobile standing near a vacant store that was formerly a saloon. Just south of Thirty-first street and Tenth avenue. When he got near he saw four men carrying cases of liquor from it. As he accosted the men the car started and two of them turned and began firing revolvers at him.
 O'Neill drew his own weapon and running after the car, returned the fire. He shot twice when he fell.
 O'Neill was carried to a drug store, where a tourniquet was made to prevent him from bleeding to death. Detectives Foley, Sheehan and Boylan, who had been called from the West Thirtieth street station, took the wounded policeman to French Hospital, where he was attended by Dr. Irwin. Although his injury was serious, O'Neill insisted on going home.
JEALOUS TAILOR SHOTS HIS WIFE
 NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—Joseph Viola, 55, a tailor, shot his wife Emma, 48, while in the kitchen of their home at No. 62 West 127th street, today, and then killed himself. Mrs. Viola is in Harlem Hospital with a bullet wound in the neck and it was said she would not recover. Jealous, the police say, was the motive for the shooting.
 Viola conducted a tailoring establishment at the 127th street address, a three-story and basement brick dwelling. This morning Mrs. Viola was preparing breakfast and had awakened her husband, a son, James, 24, and a daughter, Mary, 20. She was standing by the stove when her husband, in a bathrobe and with revolver in his hand, entered. As Mrs. Viola was about to make an outcry her husband fired at her, the bullet entering her neck. As she fell to the floor, she screamed, and her son, who was standing nearby, ran down just as Viola shot himself in the mouth.
 Patrolman Keane called Dr. Tanzer of Harlem Hospital, who pronounced Viola dead and took the woman to the hospital.
 Detective Hoffman learned that Viola was jealous of his wife and there had been numerous quarrels between the two. Viola owned the house and conducted his business there, employing several tailors.
