MAIL BOXES ON DOOR OR NO MAIL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20—Persons who live in cities and haven't mail boxes in front of their residences, are liable not to receive any mail after June 30, 1911. Certainly they will not if a provision of the post-office appropriation bill becomes law. The provision prohibits any letter carrier from delivering any mail at any house unless there is a suitable mail box on the outside to receive it.

CHATHAM, Mass. Feb. 20—Because of the formation of many rick and bars, Pollock Rip Slue, the scene of many wrecks and mishaps is to be abandoned as the main ship channel eastern entrance to Nantucket Sound. LADIES WILL COMPETE IN THE RIFLE LEAGUE

OTTAWA, Feb. 20—Two women's rifle clubs have entered in the Canadian Rifle league winter series. They will shoot against the regular military and civilian associations of men who are in the competition in gallery and miniature rifle matches. This is the first time that ladies' rifle clubs have figured in such competitions in Canada. Frank Beard, secretary of the league has received nineteen entries in the senior class of the gallery series, which includes the Ladies' Canadian Rifle club of Toronto. There are 11 entries in the cadet class of this series. In the miniature rifle series, there are ten entries in the senior class including the Quebec Ladies' club. There are four entries in the cadet class. There are fairly large entries in the two classes in the sub-target gun series. Next summer there will be a special series in rifle shooting, that is on the regular long distance ranges, open only to ladies. There will be a handsome cup offered in Great Britain for which ladies in all parts of the empire will compete, and it is expected that Ottawa ladies will have a team entered.
