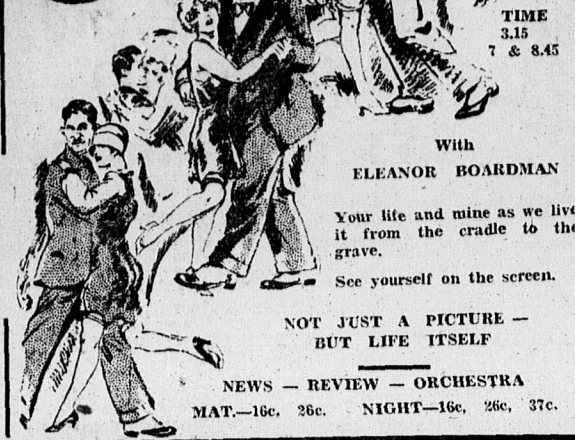

Conclusion Of Dr. MacMillan's Speech

Continued From Page 2

The House resumed at 8 p. m. Dr. MacMillan continued his address. The Hon. Premier looked with horror and spoke with all the eloquence at his command of the despicableness of not giving returned men all positions that were open.

Dr. MacMillan then took up the question of the stenographers of "liberal tendencies" alleged by Hon. J. P. MacIntyre to have all been dismissed, and stated that such was not the case. He explained that the Stewart Government had reduced the land tax in fulfillment of their platform pledges, which is also the reason why they repealed the poll tax.

They say the poll tax is a fair tax. Why don't they reimpose it? A Liberal Member.—We want to get in again (laughter). Dr. MacMillan defended the loose leaf ledger system, stating that it had not caused the country any loss.

Another thing occurred. A prisoner escaped from Queens County jail since this government came into power. Such a thing had not happened since the days of the Bell Government. Is history going to repeat itself?

Then, in his speech the other day, the Premier said something about a merry jaunt to Ottawa. Was he referring to his trip to the egg and poultry congress at Ottawa, which he alluded to this afternoon. Would you like to see this province unrepresented at such an important meeting? I think the Island was well represented. I might turn around and ask how many trips, including his trip to Europe the Hon. Minister of Agriculture has had since this Government came into office. But I wouldn't suggest that he was on a merry jaunt. Why then, should my Hon. friend do so in regard to Hon. Mr. Stewart?

Old Age Pensions: The hon. member for Rustico would have been well advised not to have made a promise "that we anticipate establishing it in this province in a manner consistent with our revenue." I wonder why they put this plank in their platform. They find now they have not got the revenue to do it.

Those provinces which have a small proportion of aged do not mind going into it. But in the Maritime provinces the great number of the aged, conditions are very different. I think the apostles of prohibition are negligent of their duty when they do not go out as missionaries to save Canada. And what of the poor old mother land and those countries of Europe which have tried it and given it up?

"We saw," he said, "four years of the workings of the prohibition act, and saw that it wasn't satisfactory. And such is the experience of all countries that have tried it. We, in the medical profession know conditions in this province as well as anyone. How is it that, if prohibition is such a wonderful temperance agency our young people have learned to drink? What is this government going to do in 1929? If the people ask for it they are going to get it, but the Stewart government was condemned for just this policy.

But you are going to enforce prohibition. If you don't, the Temperance Alliance will put you out. They put you in, and they can put you out. I hope you are happy in your position, hon. gentlemen! I know you must be, because some of you believe in Prohibition as much as we do. But to teach temperance in this province we need education. And the first thing you must learn is temperance of language. I think it must be the desire of all in this province that it will be a temperate place. We will watch and see the wonderful decrease of motor accidents in this province, when the action is amended—if it is amended properly.

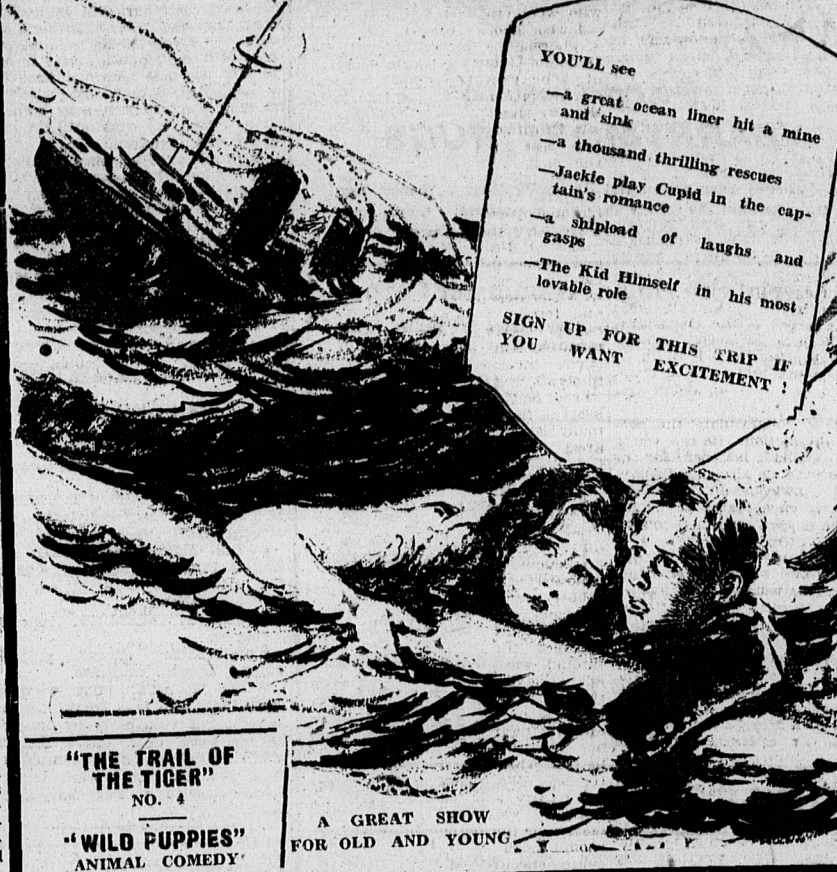
KILLED IN CHASE

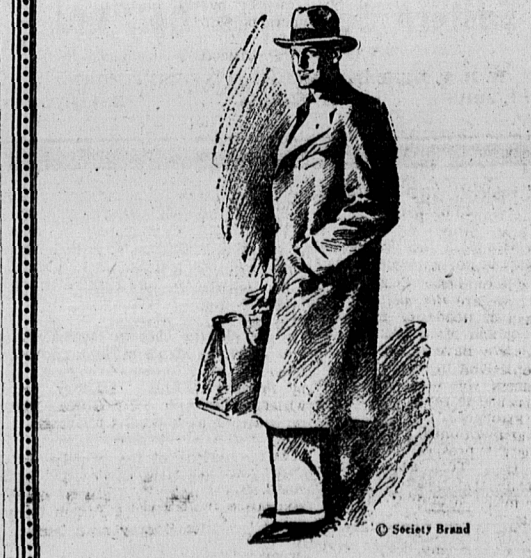
In closing we would ask you to please accept this small gift as a token of our love and esteem for you both.
