CANADA HAS NOT YET ACCEPTED OLYMPIC GAMES INVITATION

PARIS, Nov. 23.—The Olympic Committee to date has received official acceptance from the following 20 countries of its invitation to participate in next year's games: Great Britain, Australia, Bulgaria, Belgium, Denmark, Estonia, Haiti, India, Italy, New Zealand, Peru, Spain, Switzerland, Sweden, United States, Czechoslovakia, Turkey, Latvia, Egypt and Japan.

BRIGHT AND SUCCESSFUL HOCKEY SEASON ASSURED

Canada's National Pastime will be Received in 1924 With Greatest Enthusiasm.—Allan Cup Games and Stanley Cup Series to be Played in the East this Winter.—Few Maritime Men will go to States This Season.

(Canadian Press.) TORONTO, Nov. 24.—Although present in conditions the hockey in Canada will be affected and its strength reduced by the migration to the United States of many star players the officers in charge of the various leagues throughout the country are preparing for another successful season.

The Ontario Hockey Association has been hit a heavy blow by the decision to send the Granites to the Olympic games and the departure of players like Lionel Comacher, Harold Cotton, Eddie Rodden, Roy Winters and others to cities in the United States.

Rickard Hopes to Have Firpo-Wills Battle in Spring NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Tex Rickard has not given up plans to stage a match between Luis Firpo and Harry Wills in Buenos Aires next March or April, despite the negro's declaration that he would not fight in the Argentine.

And thus the officials are not hanging out any sign of discouragement. They know that the youngsters will fill the shoes of the players who have migrated and that the links will ring with the cheers of applause as Canada's young manhood helps foster the winter sport.

Hamilton and University of Toronto appear to be the strong teams in the O. H. A. senior series. They have nearly all of last year's players left. Kitchener, Onondaga, Hamilton, Hamilton and possibly Hilder, Goodwin's however, are ready to fill the vacancies.

Granites' all stars crest will be missed by O. H. A. fans but the Olympic trip means that other teams will get a chance to get into the national series something desirable in view of the fact that the Granites have never won a nationalized honor for four years. It is time for a change, and Granites have made their final appearance for some time in league competition.

Aura Lee will have to rebuild, as Cotton, Rice and Cain will not be available this season. Dinsmore, Sweet, Hayes, Harrington, and Shaw are the 1923 players again in line. St. Mary's, new entrants, have all of last year's players except Jack Smythe and expect to make trouble for the other contenders. It will be St. Mary's first appearance in senior hockey. Argonauts and Parkdale will be the other Toronto teams in the series while Oshawa, Stratford, Preston and Kitchener will form the Big Four group.

Timmins has dropped out on the H. O. H. A. Senior Series but Iroquois Falls, Sault Ste Marie and Sudbury will be back as strong as ever. It is thought that the N. O. H. A. champions will be the team to best this coming season for the Allan Cup.

There will be no falling off in entrants in the O. H. A. intermediate and junior series. Argonauts, Parkdale, Toronto C. C., St. Mary's U. of T., St. Andrew's, Upper Canada College, U. T. S., St. Michael's College, and Aura Lee are the Toronto entrants. Owen Sound is said to have rounded out a powerful squad and will make a bid for the championship.

In the West the teams are getting stronger and it is thought that they will return to almost pre-war strength. Winnipeg Falcons, Selkirk, Port Arthur and Fort William have formed a powerful team and the winners will be favored to represent the West in the Allan Cup series.

The Allan Cup games will be played in the east this winter and so will the Stanley Cup series. This eastern fans are reasonably sure to see some thrilling struggles. Toronto will be the Mecca for the hockey champions and their followers in the winter play-off games, but the Stanley Cup contests will be fought on the ice of the team winning the honors, each city having artificial ice plants.

Babe Dye is Still a Holdout

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—"Babe" Dye declines to sign with the Toronto hockey team of the pro league until he ascertains definitely whether he is to be included in a deal now being negotiated by the Buffalo baseball club, which may result in the Toronto player being sent to one of the major leagues.

Baseball and hockey do not fit together very well. The hockey season is just reaching its peak when the ball teams start for the South to get into condition. A two to one shot that the Maritime hard season of strenuous sport such as pro hockey with its cuts, bruises and strains, does not fit a baseball player for another hard all-summer campaign every day.

Hockey players are quite as apt to "go stale" as any other athletes. The jump from baseball into hockey affords no opportunity for recuperation.

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Young Stribling After M. McTigue

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—Young Stribling, schoolboy light-heavyweight boxer arrived in New York today from Georgia on his way to Boston where he fights K. O. Egan next Monday night.

Stribling conferred with Tex Rickard at Madison Square Garden relative to possible bouts in New York, particularly a return match with Mike McTigue, world's light-heavyweight champion, with whom the Georgian youth fought a draw at Columbus, Ga., several weeks ago.

Unless the State Athletic Commission, however, lifts its bars which prevent Stribling, because of his age, from engaging in longer than six round encounters, there is little chance of him signing for any match here.

Olympic Hockey to Begin Jan. 28

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—A communication was received last night by the Canadian Olympic Committee from the French Olympic Committee acknowledging the receipt of the official entry for Canada in ice hockey in the eight Olympiad to be held at Chamonix in January 1924. Mr. Frantz Reichel, secretary-general of the French Olympic Committee writes as follows: "The official programme has been forwarded to you, giving all particulars concerning hockey and skating."

"Hockey begins on January 28, the speed skating will take place on January 26 and 27, and there are no races for women."
