EDITORIAL NOTES.

The Montreal Witness tells that \$100,000 a month is believed to be going out of Montreal into the pockets of the lottery concerns, and that this money is mostly the hard earnings of the poor. It happens also that a bill passed through the Senate by the Minister of Justice, and assigned to strongly check the lottery evil has been "hung up" in the Commons. So the present disgraceful conditions of things must go on for another year at least.

According to prevent appearances the horseless carriages will be in almost universal use within a few years to come. When that time comes there will be need for a vast number of skilled drivers. They will need to be intelligent, with a good knowledge of machinery and also specially trained for their duties. The ordinary horse at his best requires not very much guidance. The railway locomotive and the street car are guided by the rails on which they run. But the auto-mobile car will require alert watchfulness and skilful guidance to thread its way among a host of similar vehicles going in all directions along and across the streets. There will be a new and possibly a remunerative calling for the auto-mobile drivers of the future.

Not a few of the millionaires of the United States have been attracted by the titles and glitter of high life in Great Britain and the European continent, so far as to pass out of sympathy with republican institutions. Among these in Mr. William Waldorf Astor, who some years ago took up his residence in England. Quite recently he has repudiated his citizenship in the United States and become a naturalised British subject. For that matter many thousands of British subjects, including many Canadians, have become naturalised in the United States. This fact did not prevent a small mob of the young bloods in New York from burning the effigy of Waldorf Astor the other night, the effigy being adorned with the legend, "Astor the Traitor." It was rather a petty piece of business, but boys must amuse themselves in some way.

It appears that the delegate from the citizens of Chicago who went to Ottawa on a mission to Lord Minto and Sir Wilfrid Laurier did not succeed in his enterprise. The Government of the United States is about to erect a large building in the Windy City. The Chicagoans wanted some Canadian notables to attend and give greater eclat to the cornerstone-laying. But there is nothing international about the building, however fine that is to be erected. We would not expect President McKinley and his Secretary of State to come to Montreal and grace the laying of a corner stone for a new custom house. We may rest assured that when Lord Minto and Sir Wilfrid Laurier did not accept the invi-

tation to Chicago there was nothing ungracious in their declination. They were invited to a function which would be infra dig. for them to attend and they did not accept. That was all.
