Throne Speech Outlines Policy Of Retrenchment

Depressed Market Conditions And Loss Of Falconwood And P. W. College Cited As Factors In Problem Confronting Government.

Following is the text of the Speech delivered by His Honour Lieutenant Governor Dalton at the opening of the Legislature yesterday:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly of Prince Edward Island:—

1. Upon this, the opening of the First Session of the Forty-second General Assembly, it is my privilege to welcome you to the discharge of your duties as representatives of the people of this Province.

2. During the month of October our Province had the honor of welcoming a for a short time entertaining His Excellency the Right Honourable the Earl of Bessborough, Governor General of Canada. We express the hope that his charming consort—the Countess of Bessborough, will accompany His Excellency upon the occasion of his next visit.

3. We join with our fellow subjects throughout the Empire in keenly looking forward to the approaching Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa and we earnestly trust that the great gathering will result in renewed prosperity and progress within the Empire.

4. The world wide economic depression, which has like a pall enveloped the civilized world, has not altogether passed us by. We have not suffered to the same de-

gree as other sections more highly industrialized, but during the past year the strain has been felt by our people, and in many parts of our province want and privation has been seen.

5. Agriculture, the basic industry of our Province, has suffered severely. There has been a greater percentage of decrease in the prices of agricultural products than in any other line of industry. Coupled with low prices is the difficulty of finding markets. My government will not spare any effort which may assist in finding an outlet for our crops. In co-operation with the Federal Government we have done, and will continue to do everything possible to have the market of Great Britain opened for our potatoes. The benefit of Co-operative Marketing organizations is becoming more apparent and a larger percentage of the farm products moved during the past year have been marketed through these sources. It will be the policy of my Department of Agriculture to encourage every phase of mixed farming, and particular attention will be given to the educational aspect, stressing the work of Boys' and Girls' Clubs and it is intended to include other lines in addition to live stock.

6. Notwithstanding the sharp decline in the prices of all commodities, including silver fox pelts, there was a keen demand for this article at the reduced prices, with the result that practically the entire crop of 1931 has been disposed of.

7. Recognizing that Education and Public Health are of supreme importance to our people, my government hastened to appoint a Minister to direct the work of these two Departments, hoping to give a maximum of service to this province.

8. In the Department of Education, it is gratifying to know that at the beginning of the present fiscal year all the Public Schools were in operation and that a keener appreciation of Education is apparent in the largely increased daily attendance of pupils.

9. The destruction by fire of Prince of Wales College is a matter

of deep regret to the many friends of the Institution, at home and abroad.

10. Despite many difficulties, class work was resumed with the loss of only one day and is being prosecuted with commendable zeal by students and teachers.

11. It is the intention of my government to rebuild the College with the least possible delay.

12. During the past year, two very important events took place in our Public Health development. The first was the opening of our Provincial Sanatorium in June last and shortly afterwards, on the First of July, the inauguration of a full time Public Health service for Prince Edward Island.

13. The Sanatorium, even in the short time it has functioned has fully demonstrated its worth and must prove of inestimable value in the campaign against Tuberculosis, and the Public Health Department is daily enlarging its field of activities in its endeavour to give Prince Edward Island an up to date and efficient Public Health Service.

14. With other Provinces of Canada, my Government has availed itself of the measure of relief provided by the Federal Government. The money thus provided has been expended through our Municipalities, or directly in public works, and has proven of great assistance to our people.

15. In the latter part of 1931, this Province suffered a most severe loss in the complete destruction by fire of Falconwood Hospital. My Government has been able to provide for the care and comfort of the inmates without serious inconvenience, but because of the great expenditures required in reconstruction of this Institution, as well as Prince of Wales College, at a time of financial strain, it is not the intention of my Government to embark upon any elaborate programme of Public Works, but care and attention will be devoted to the highways and bridges of the Province.

16. A bill to provide for Workmen's Compensation, and other measures of importance, will be introduced for your consideration.

17. The Public Accounts will be laid before you and the estimates of revenue and expenditure for the current year will be submitted.

18. In view of the very urgent need of economy in the conduct of government, I am assured that the estimates of expenditure have been prepared with the utmost regard for that retrenchment which is so vitally necessary.

19. I now leave you to the business of the Session, with full confidence that your deliberations will be governed by consideration for the best interests and welfare of the Province.

20. I pray that Divine Providence will guide you in your work.

To which the Clerk of the House replied "Mr. Speaker: His Honor hath the utmost confidence in the loyalty and attachment to this Assembly, to His Majesty's person and Government, and in the wisdom, temper and prudence which will accompany all their proceedings, and he doth most readily and willingly grant and allow them all their privileges in as full and ample a manner as they have had any time heretofore been granted and allowed.

With respect to yourself, Mr. Speaker, though His Honor is sensible that you do not stand in need of such assurance, His Honor will ever put the most favorable construction upon your words and actions."

His Honor was then pleased to open the session with the Speech from the Throne, the text of which appears elsewhere in today's Guardian.

On motion of Mr. Heath Strong, K.C., of Summerside, seconded by Mr. W.A. Stewart, of Charlottetown, it was resolved that the Speech of His Honor be taken into consideration on Thursday and that it be made the first order of the day on that and every subsequent day until disposed of.

House to the vacant chair of the Minister of Public Works. For over fifteen years Mr. Stewart had been a member of the Legislature and could not recall any session when attention had not been drawn to the passing of some one who at some time had been a public servant; but he could not recall any death which had struck the Province with such deep sorrow as that of the late Hon. Leonard MacNeill. It was unnecessary to mention Mr. MacNeill's ability and qualities of heart and mind which endeared him to all with whom he came in contact. They were the same qualities which were present in the person of his father, the late Hon. James A. MacNeill. Chief among these qualities in father and son was faithfulness. The speaker felt privileged to have been associated with the late Minister, and to have the opportunity of paying this tribute to his memory. He extended deepest sympathy to the bereaved family on behalf of the House.

Mr. J. P. McIntyre also expressed the sympathy of the House in the passing of Hon. Mr. MacNeill, and his appreciation of that gentleman's character. He had handed over to Mr. MacNeill without any animosity the office of Minister of Public Works; knowing as he did that it was a position which was both onerous and responsible.

Mr. MacNeill, had he been spared, would have filled the position with credit to himself and the government. As for the late Hon. James A. MacNeill, no member of the House had been more honoured by members of both parties. Mr. MacIntyre concluded by expressing the hope that the next appointee to the position would be "broad shouldered" enough to stand up against the criticisms which the Opposition might see fit to make with regard to the Public Works department.

Hon. Mr. Stewart expressed regret at the unavoidable absence of W. M. Lea, leader of the Opposition. Mr. Lea's indisposition was not serious, however, and it was expected that he would be in his place tomorrow.

The House then adjourned until 3 p. m. today.

E. Arsenault, Commissioner to administer the oath of allegiance to the members elect, "having come in to the place where the Assembly sits, the Clerk of the House, Mr. H. E. Dawson, did then and there read the proclamation of the Lieutenant-Governor convening the Assembly, also the commission appointing the said Commissioners.

Mr. H. E. Stewart, Deputy Provincial Secretary, delivered to the Commissioners the Returning Officer's returns of the writs of the last general election and read the details of the said returns.

The oath of allegiance was then administered to all the members and each signed the oath.

The Clerk then read the following letter:

The Clerk having declared A. A. MacDonald Esq., M.D., duly elected, he was taken out of his place by the Hon. Mr. Stewart and the Hon. Mr. McMillan and conducted to the Chair. Standing on the upper step, he addressed the House as follows:

press my grateful acknowledgments for the high honor conferred on me by the House in electing me to be their Speaker. Conscious as I am of my comparative inexperience in parliamentary procedure, I should have hesitated about accepting a position involving so much responsibility, were it not for the fact that I know that I shall be able at all times to rely with confidence upon the courtesy, forbearance and kindness of every member of the Assembly.
