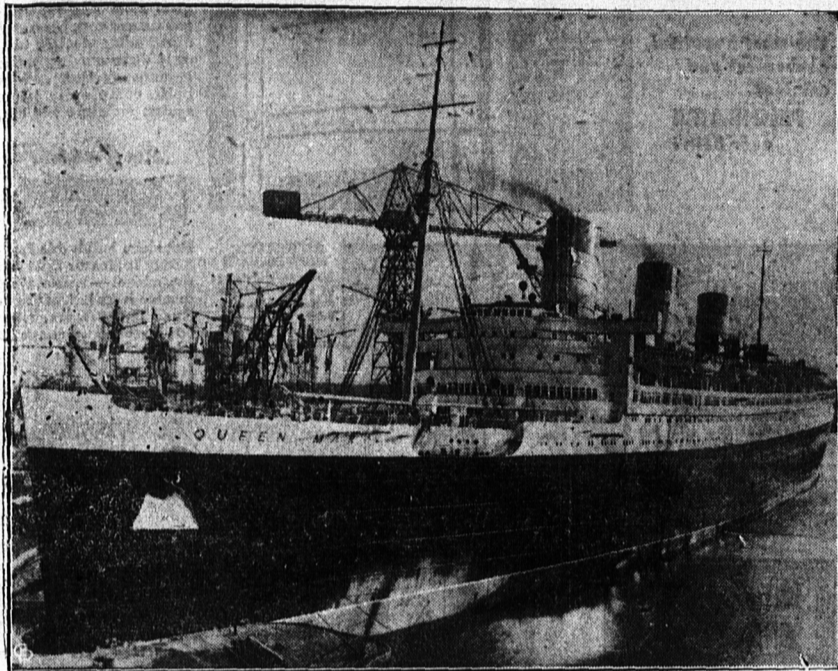


Floods Menace New Sections In United States

Refuses To Table Orders-in-Council Liberals Passed

Dictatorial Action Of King Government In Striking Contrast To Attitude In Opposition.

OTTAWA, March 23—Prime Minister Mackenzie King today refused to comply with a request from Conservative leader Bennett for the tabling of all orders-in-council passed since the Liberal government came into office. Mr. Bennett made his request in a motion for a return on the order paper of the House of Commons. The motion was voted down without a recorded vote.

For five years Conservatives had been denounced for governing Canada by order-in-council. Mr. Bennett said. He wished to have the orders-in-council passed since October so that it could be seen to what extent it was necessary to pass orders-in-council under a Liberal government. It would be too expensive, said Mr. King, to make copies of a large number of routine or minor documents. The government was ready to consider requests by Mr. Bennett for documents on specific subjects. The opposition leader indicated he might make such requests.

Condon Ready Will Determine Speaker's Status For Conference

NEW YORK, March 23—Dr. John F. Condon tonight made public a telegram to Governor Harold Hoffman of New Jersey agreeing to confer with him and attorney general David Wilentz but questioning the Governor's impartiality in the investigation of the Lindbergh kidnapping.

OTTAWA, March 23—The House committee on privileges and elections was instructed today to investigate the powers of the Speaker to hire and discharge employees during the dissolution of one Parliament and the assembly of another.

RIO DE JANEIRO, March 23—President Getulio Vargas tonight ordered the enforcement of martial law for 90 days throughout Brazil.

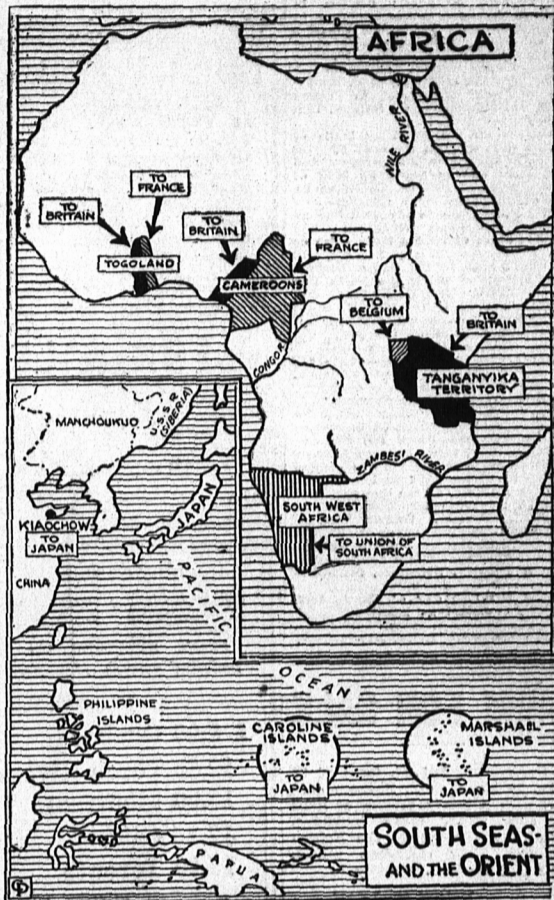
Hitler Will Turn Down Locarno Proposals, Belief
