THE HILLSBORO BRIDGE.

There is considerable disappointment felt and expressed at the slow progress making this spring on the Hillsboro Bridge. The midsummer date fixed for the completion of the contract is now rapidly approaching and it is now evident that the work cannot be completed within the time specified. This is regrettable on many grounds. There is not only public disappointment but public loss when a public work of large cost is unduly delayed. The bridge is to cost the most part of a million dollars out right to which must be added the interest on the expenditure down to the time of opening the bridge for traffic. Moreover the railway to Murray Harbor in which much capital is locked up and which could be opened for traffic at an early day if the bridge were now approaching completion, must await the completion of the bridge before the people along its route can have the advantage of a train service.

I ought to be stated that the illness of the contractor, who in consequence of a serious attack of pneumonia spent the winter in the south, is offered as an excuse for the backward state of construction work on the bridge and the slow progress being made this spring. All will regret Mr. Haney's illness alike for his own sake and on account of the important work he has in hand. Mr. Haney is now in Canada and we may hope that presently the work will be pressed on rapidly to completion. All will agree that if the bridge and railway are to be of any value at all their large cost demands that they shall be made productive at the earliest possible date. And it is also to be observed that both bridge and railway will be of much greater utility in the

summer than in the winter season, as in the winter the bridge will not be used as a public highway, and the winter traffic on the railway will not probably be heavy. For all these reasons it seems regrettable that the traffic of the railway and bridge during the coming summer will be lost.

We reprint this morning from the Toronto News interviews with three prominent Charlottetown pastors on the timely subject of church union. It will be seen from a perusal of these reports that Rev. Messrs Young and Lodge very heartily approve of the union movement, while Rev. Mr. Fullerton takes a more conservative and hesitant view. The News correspondent credits the Pastor of St. James' with being well qualified to speak for the Presbyterians of Prince Edward Island, which is no doubt true in a general way, although from conversation with a number of Presbyterian pastors we are inclined to think the majority of the members of the Island Presbytery are rather in favor of than opposed to the projected union.

It is altogether astonishing after the repeated remonstrances in the press that the intolerable nuisance of a manure pile at the head of Southport wharf has been again permitted this spring. Undoubtedly apart from the disgust and nausea to persons driving along the highway there is added the danger of serious and fatal disease from this cause. Diphtheria has broken out in Southport and within a few days past a young man has died of the malady. There is little wonder that this has happened. It is only a natural result of existing unsanitary conditions. It is amazing that in the twentieth century such nuisances should be tolerated. We know of no civilized country where such things would be permitted. If only for shame's sake the Commissioner of Public Works should instantly cause this nuisance to be removed, and prevent the possibility of its recurrence.
