Brought together by their common love of horses, Helen Bedford, daughter of the socially prominent and tremendously wealthy Frederick T. The romance of this couple started two years ago when McCashin called on Mr. Bedford and told him that he believed he could improve the appearance of his horses and make them bigger winners in the show ring. Rockefeller, who was one of the leading harness horse owners a couple of decades ago. Montague and Charlottetown race meets he never missed, and those of us who knew him best looked forward to receiving his cheery smile and warm handclasp. Let us hope that in the Great Beyond he will meet his old friends, Hammond Kelly, ex-Mayor Brown, Henry Hooper, Peter Carroll, Spencer Clark and dozens of others who made the race game so popular in the days gone by.

T. V. Holdaway, Houlton, Maine, who campaigned Bud Wenger 2:05 1-4 at the Provincial Exhibition the past two seasons, has purchased the noted race horse Peter Dale, 2:03 1-4, eligible to the 2:12 pace. It transpires that the real owner of Ray Henley 2:01 3-4 is our friend Earle Avery, of Woodstock, but Ira Scott of Saint John, N.B. Earle, however, will train and race the noted "side-wheeler."

An Italian has purchased Twilight Song 2:01 1-4 for \$20,000. Other fast record performers to go overseas include Joy Lincoln 2:01 1-4, Calumet Epson 2:00 1-4 and Caricia 2:06 1-4. A Swedish breeder has purchased twenty brood mares in foal to Walnut Hall stallions, that are being shipped shortly to the northern climate. Not in many years, if ever, have so many standard bred horses been bought for export to Europe as this season.

It may be news to our readers that Italy is the brightest spot in Europe for harness racing. Their race tracks are the best laid out, best cared for and the sport is more flourishing in the land of Mussolini than in Austria, Germany, France, Belgium, Holland, Norway or Sweden.

Western Canada is lining up for harness racing early. A circuit is now being formed, to take in such towns and cities as Brandon, DeLorme, Wawanesa, Holland, Stonewall, Moosejaw, Regina and Portage, in the adjoining provinces of Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

Grand Duchess 2:07 1-4, which a well known Charlottetown horseman was interested in and almost purchased a few months ago, is on her way to Sweden where she will be raced by P. P. Anderson of Malmö.

Twenty years ago the United States army was purchasing tens of thousands of horses to equip the American Divisions in France. Thousands of mules were also bought for the U.S. and British armies.

J. H. C. Craswell, St. Eleonors, P.E.I., is one of the proudest men in this Province, because everyone that visits his place raves about "Masco", a yearling colt by Bellini Scott 2:09 1-4, out of a Captain Aubrey mare. I received in the mail a snap of the future champion and he looks every inch a trotter. He is beautifully built and has been mannered so perfectly that he stands as steady as an old soldier.

When Alexander the Great marched against Darius the Mede, he gave to his generals all his wealth and the sovereignty of the various countries he ruled over. When asked what he had reserved for himself he replied, "Hope." And with that attribute, his martial spirit he imbued in his soldiers, he conquered the world. Alexander's spirit of hope was no greater than that possessed by Mr. Craswell, who looks forward to the day when he will be sitting on the sulky riding behind the champion Futurity trotter of Prince Edward Island and giving the just to George Calbeck, Harry O'Brien, Willard Kelly, Myron McArthur and a lot of others. Well, I am sure hosts of friends won't feel a bit badly—no, not even those

competing against him—if Mr. Craswell's dream come true. There have been many curious contests for wagers, but I doubt if our readers have heard of anything more novel than the following one as related in the "Spirit of the Times," May 24th, 1882. It was a race between a horse to harness, a pedestrian and an equestrian. The latter are people who spend part of their lives on stilts and can cover territory very rapidly in that elevated manner. Conditions were that the race was to be 268 miles with the city of Bordeaux, France, as the goal. Whoever first reached that city from the starting point would be awarded the grand prize. Europeans were greatly interested in its result and it was a most talked of affair, working up to a great deal of excitement. The horse, Charlatan, ridden by Mr. Fitté, arrived first, owing to an accident to his vehicle he had to accomplish the last 117 miles to saddle. His time was 62 hours and 27 minutes. Mr. Fouconneau, the man on stilts, was only 27 minutes behind him. The pedestrian dropped out before half the distance was covered.

Dr. J. M. Nicholson, who furnished the above item, was quite interested in the reference made to Flying Jib 1:59 1-2 in a recent issue, and supplies the information that the Algonia site of Flying Jib was a half-brother of Hernando 2:30, imported to this Province by Judge Neil MacLeod, of Charlottetown. Old timers will remember the rivalry between Hernando and Black Pilot and the famous race between them for the stallion championship in 1886. After Flying Jib had paced his sensational mile against him in 1:58 1-2, hitched with running mate at Chillicothe, Ohio, October 4th, 1894, the world was agog with his fame. The "Spirit of the Times" reporting the event started with this ditty:

Yes he's a jib, Is Flying Jib, Is something of a "kicker;" For when he goes Nobody knows Where he'll stop the "kicker."

Bill Roach, reporting in the Canadian Sportsman the Wood's Memorial Stake for 2:24 pacers, raced at Toronto, November 11th, writes: "Over a thousand devotees of the harness horse and sulky sport saw Gilbert Gratian take the lead to the heat of the four-heat event in an afternoon's racing that was begun in bright sunshine and finished in semi-darkness long after sundown. In fact it was so dark when Gilbert Gratian paced home under the wire in the final heat that many fans came to the judges stand and claimed that a mistake had been made in the placing of Benny's vester, and that he had finished second instead of seventh. The bad-acting Scotty Gratian had no less than three drivers handle him during the four heats. The fastest time was 2:15 1/2 in the second heat, won by Benny Harvester."

According to the Australian Trotting Record, leading harness horse publication in the Commonwealth, they have a pacer, Long Derby, down in that country that can take the measure of any horse in the world—trotter or pacer. He recently paced the Melbourne show track, which is a little over a third of a mile, in the very fast time of 2:08 3-5, and the track was not specially prepared. There are two other pacers in Australia, Indianapolis and U. Scott, that are likely two-minute propositions.

Ice races will be held on the Ottawa River ice January 15th, 17th and 18th, under the auspices of the Landsdowne Park Driving Club which now has a paid up membership of almost 400. Reservations have been made for stables by well known race men with high class horses, so that there is every assurance of its being a success. It is many years since the Ottawa ice races were a feature of the winter sports program in the Capital City and it is very encouraging to the game.

Perhaps the most sensational pacer of many years is the three-year-old world's champion, Billy Direct, 1:58, which Vic Fleming won every race with the past season, and lost but one heat, the first that he started in. He is sired by the deceased Napoleon Direct 1:59 3-4, one of the best performers on the pace of some twenty years ago, and the first pacer to pull the late Ed Geers a mile in better than two minutes. In this Province we have a son of Napoleon Direct in Sampson Hal, 2:02 2-4, brought here by George Buntain and now in the ownership of a party in King's County. Just the other day I was talking to some horsemen about Sampson Hal colts and they said they were seen quite a number and they were excellent individuals. It is the excellent individuality of the writer's belief that Sampson Hal will thrive to see a Sampson Hal winner of one of the futurities in the near future.

Minor League Convention Is Concluded

(By Earl Hilligan, Associated Press Sports Writer) MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 3.—(AP)—Major League baseball traders marched on Chicago tonight, ready to touch off a blast of selling and buying "fireworks" which failed to explode with more than a mild "pop" at the minor league's 38th annual meeting.

There was plenty of activity as the convention wound up its business, but it wasn't the "ivory" market variety. Big League managers, owners and scouts poured out of hotels in a mass movement toward Chicago and the American and National League sessions which open Monday.

Expectancy prevailed that the Van Lingle Mungo deal would break before the leagues held their joint session next Wednesday. Throughout the minor sessions reports were rampant the Brooklyn Dodger pitcher ace would change uniforms—going either to New York Giants or Chicago Cubs. Another rumor heard today was that Manager Jimmy Dykes of Chicago White Sox wanted Rudy York, young Detroit catcher, but it was deemed unlikely Mickey Cochrane would dispose of his hard hitting backstop.

Three all Major League transactions were completed: (1) Chicago sent Vern Kennedy, Dick Walker and Tony Piet to Detroit for Marvin Owen, Gerald Walker and Mike Tresh; (2) St. Louis Browns traded Joe Vo-mik to Boston's Red Sox for Buck Newsom, Buster Mills and Ralph (Red) Kress; (3) Washington traded pitcher Ed Lince to the Browns for South-paw Elton Hoggset.

Judge W. G. Bramham was re-elected president of the National Association of minor leagues for five years with a salary increase from \$12,500 to \$20,000 annually.
