OUR OTTAWA LETTER

(From our own Correspondent.)

OTTAWA, June 18.—That the migratory instinct is strongly engrafted in the average Prince Edward Islander is a matter of common knowledge. The limited opportunities for expansion which the Island offers is doubtless the cause of this, for the average native son is ambitious, and, given the opportunity, he is able to find his own way with the best products of other places. Writing in this strain recalls the Jarvis family, sons of the late Dr. H. B. and Mrs. Jarvis, both of whom are fondly remembered by all who know them in Summerside. These boys are all residents of Ontario, all occupy positions of responsibility and are held in the highest esteem because of their exceptional character and their genius and ability. The oldest son, Ernest Frederick, was the first to break family ties. Early in life Ernest left his island home and came to Ottawa. He entered the government service shortly after his arrival, and worked his way up from a junior clerkship in the Militia Department to the position of Assistant Deputy Minister and Secretary of the Militia Council. When Canada entered the war, the work of the Militia Department was greatly increased. New branches had to be created and developed, and in this work Mr. Jarvis' ability as an organizer was strongly demonstrated; indeed, to him, perhaps more than to any other man in the service, is due the large measure of success which has attended the work of the government along this line. It is, therefore, not surprising that in the distribution of honors recently Mr. Jarvis' exceptional ability should be recognized by his elevation to a Companionship in the Imperial Service Order. This high honor was not sought by Mr. Jarvis, neither was it expected; but that it was well merited no one acquainted with the recipient will deny.

time, and is credited with doing wonderful stunts with a miner's outfit. The west also appealed to him when the gold fever was at its height. Wherever he went he worked with his eyes and ears as well as with his hands; and on his return to the east took up literary work, producing several books which have had wide circulation. Of these perhaps the best known are "Trails and Tales of the West" and "The Remittance Man," both inimitable presentations of life as he saw it in the course of his wanderings. He was in Toronto and happily married when the war broke out. When Canada decided to participate in the struggle and the boys in khaki began to leave our shores, the wanderlust again took possession of the Jarvis last-born, and one fine day found him in khaki on his way overseas, as a member of a motor unit. There he is at this moment, doing his utmost to put the Germans out of business. It is a safe bet, however, that incidentally he is getting lots of local color for future stories bearing on the war, which will be well worth reading.

It may interest Knights of Columbus in the Maritime Provinces to hear that at the convention of Ontario Knights in Windsor last week it was decided to make another big "drive" this year in the interests of the Overseas Catholic Hut Fund. These huts are to Catholic soldiers what the Y. M. C. A. is to soldiers outside the church. But, like the Y. M. C. A., they are open to all irrespective of religious affiliations. Last year's "drive" netted a large amount of money for this purpose; but a larger sum is aimed at this year as the need is greater. Before the work is entered upon every city in Canada possessing a Council has been organized, and when it is recalled that the Order has a membership of over seventy thousand and Columbus Homes dot the landscape, from Charlottetown to Vancouver the magnitude of the undertaking will be appreciated. The Knights of Columbus are strongly represented in the west zone, and many others are on their way. The Knights at home appreciate the sacrifices these brave fellows are making and are not backward in coming to their assistance when the opportunity presents itself. Several other propositions of a considerable magnitude were before the meeting, but with the Knights the winning of the war is the main thing, and these had to stand over for another year.

but the recognition was mutual and instant. "Dave," as he was called by his intimates in the "good old days," is looking exceedingly fit despite the fact that he has passed the sixty-third milestone on life's journey. He left Charlottetown for the Klondyke at the time of the gold rush in the late eighties, when there was little or no rail connection with that part of Canada and Chicout Pass had to be negotiated on foot and supplies ratted in by way of the Stickeen River. Settling in Dawson he engaged in mining and merchandising. After residing there for several years he came east to Vancouver where he is at present domiciled. For some years he has been actively engaged as a mediator in industrial development, one of his latest promotions being Golden Windermere, a proposition in which Sir Charles Dalton and several other Prince Edward Islanders are interested. In this connection I may state that a short time ago I heard from other sources that an English syndicate was negotiating for this property with every prospect of the deal going through, at a price which should handsomely repay the shareholders. Mr. McKay's activities at the moment are concerned with a gold-mining proposition in Northern Ontario, in which he has great faith. His making interests necessitate his spending a good deal of time in this province, and he takes advantage of every opportunity to visit Ottawa, where he has many business and personal friends.

Sir Thomas White has been invited to revisit Washington to further discuss with Lord Reading, the British Ambassador, and the officials of the American Treasury Department, the exchange problems arising out of the war. The discussion will be a continuation of those already held. The exchange situation continues to give a great deal of trouble to the financiers of Canada, Great Britain and the United States. Two recent orders, one prohibiting the export of gold without license, and the other stopping the importation to Canada of certain imports, were made with a view to helping out the situation in this respect, but it is admitted that unless there is a large voluntary restriction on buying from the United States the list of prohibited articles will have to be extended. The recent list only touches imports valued at some \$15,000,000, while the balance of trade against Canada with the United States totals several hundreds of millions.
