The new Groceteria just inaugurated by Jenkins & Sons Ltd. has certainly made a hit with the hundreds who visited the store last week.

Mr. Hazen Baker, the genial and progressive manager, conducted a Guardian reporter over the store, explaining at the same time every detail in connection therewith. The arrangement, it is said, is simple indeed, but thorough. There are no waits and everything works as smoothly as a well oiled machine.

On entering the store one notices a turn-stile to the right through which the customer passes. After passing through he cannot return the same way, but must make the round, coming out at the wrapping or tie-up counter.

After passing through the turn-stile the customer is handed a basket in which he places the groceries chosen as he goes along the line of well-stocked shelves. It may be mentioned here that all the groceries are price tagged with the old and new prices, showing the saving made.

There is a customer here for this is the idea of the Groceteria. There are no waits, everybody helps themselves and when supplied follows right along to the cashier and wrapping counter, where the parcels are either placed in a tidy shopping bag or carefully wrapped.

Lincoln Overdue

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Mar 11.—The Federal Telegraph Company today reported that the Dollar Liner President Lincoln, bound from Seattle to Japan had not reported her daily position since Friday, when the vessel was approaching a storm area off the coast of Japan.

The vessel left Seattle for Yokohama on Feb. 27, and carried approximately 100 passengers and a crew of 250. Officials of the Dollar Line tonight admitted the vessel was sixteen hours overdue and that no word had been received from her, but pointed out that if the craft was moving in stormy waters the speed would be materially lessened.

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
