HENRY W. JONES

The death of Mr. Henry W. Jones, occurred at his home in Hillsboro, on Dec. 30.

Although his health had not been good for some time, he was able to get up and have dinner with his family on Christmas Day. But on Dec. 28 he suffered a stroke, from which he failed to rally and passed peacefully away on the above date. A man of sterling qualities and a jovial disposition he endeared himself, not only to his family but to all who knew him, especially to his grand-children in whom he took a great interest.

Robert W. Jones of 79 Portledge Ave. Moncton is a brother, and Mrs. George L. Slipp of Sussex and Miss Alice Jones of Petticoe are sisters.

The funeral was held on New Year's Day and was largely attended, and the large number of floral tributes which surrounded the casket, showed the esteem in which the deceased was held.

After a short service at the home in Hillsboro, the remains were taken to Petticoe, where a public service was held in the Baptist Church.

The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. D. F. MacDormand, and the choir sang favorite hymns "No Night There," "The Old Rugged Cross," and "Abide with Me." The pallbearers were: Messrs Evans Bours, Arthur Jones, E. C. Rice, Moore Perry, Ira Lewis, and Ernest Crandall.

Interment was in the Family plot in the Baptist Cemetery.

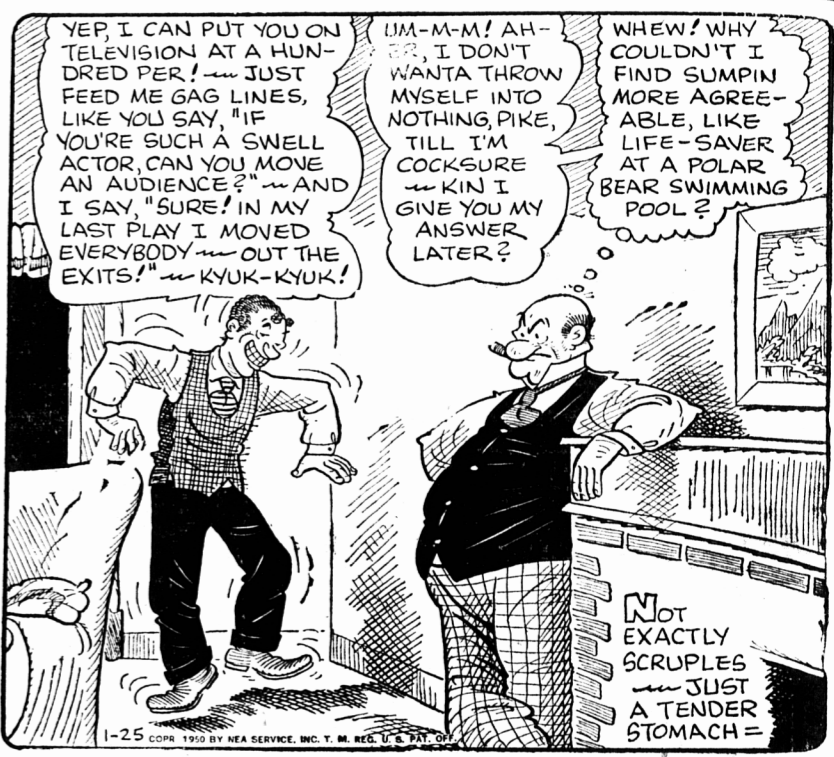

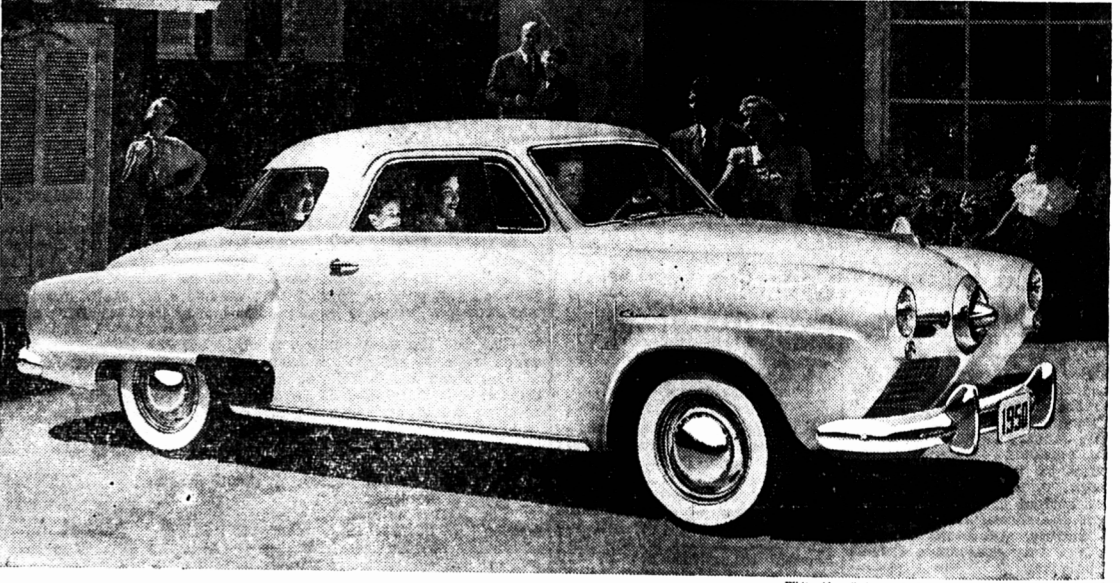
