**NOTE:** The above includes, under  
 miscellaneous expenditure the item  
 of \$2,500.00 grant to the Hospitals,  
 which was struck out of the esti-  
 mates before it was passed.

He announced that a grant of  
 \$1250.00 even to the two Hospitals  
 had been inserted in the estimates.  
 \$150.00 was provided for in the  
 estimates for hand concerts.

Councillor MacLeod said the band  
 would put on eight concerts for  
 \$350.00, or \$42.00 a concert. They  
 would have 20 or 21 men, on the av-  
 erage in attendance at each concert.

Councillor Foster felt the concerts  
 were rather late in starting, and so,  
 if they could not give the concerts  
 in reasonably warm weather, they  
 might be paid for at so much per  
 concert per rata.

Councillor Prowse felt the concert  
 should be arranged for at so much  
 per concert, one concert per week.  
 There would not be time, he felt,  
 for eight weekly concerts.

Councillor MacLeod expressed  
 himself as opposed to the grant of  
 \$1250.00 per year to care of the Ho-  
 spitals. He felt the grants should be  
 increased to the Orphanages, the  
 Childrens Aid Society and the Free  
 Dispensary rather than that the  
 money should be given to the ho-  
 spitals, paying \$2,000.00 to each  
 of the hospitals. That sum does not  
 begin to pay for the poor patients,  
 the majority of which came from  
 the city. The bills of these, he felt  
 would come to easily \$3,000.00. He  
 felt the City should give the grant.

Councillor Holman thought that  
 an increased grant should be given  
 to the orphanages, if the grant was  
 given the hospitals. He felt the mat-  
 ter might receive further con-  
 sideration. And then, too, the grant  
 to the Provincial Exhibition might  
 come in for criticism.

Councillor MacLeod also felt that  
 before the grant was given a cate-  
 of the Council should be held to  
 determine what should be done in  
 the matter. In the course of his re-  
 marks, he spoke of the rising cost  
 of rooms and treatment to the pa-  
 tients as year succeeded year.

aid and Mr. W. K. Rogers with the  
 Council. He felt that something  
 should certainly be given the ho-  
 spitals, still, if the Council required  
 a statement it might be left over  
 to the next meeting.

Councillor Prowse said the City  
 was morally bound to pay the bills  
 of poor citizens at the hospitals.  
 However, he was perfectly ready to  
 pay the estimates without the hos-  
 pital grant, if that was what the  
 Council wished.

Councillor Foster, suggested that  
 the estimates be passed, with the  
 exception of the grant to the hos-  
 pitals, which could be left over to  
 the next meeting.

Accordingly, a resolution was  
 introduced and passed to the effect  
 that the estimates for the year be  
 now passed, with the exception of  
 the \$2500.00 grant to the two hos-  
 pitals.

Approved by Councillor Prowse, se-  
 conded by Councillor Kennedy,  
 Councillor Foster spoke of the  
 fact that our shade trees were at-  
 tacked by caterpillars. He had ap-  
 proved Prof. Clarke of the Experi-  
 mental Farm, who was sending in  
 his spraying machine tomorrow  
 with a couple of men to man it.  
 Thus all the trees could be treated.

He wished to thank Professor  
 Clarke for his courtesy in lending  
 the machine, emphasizing the fact  
 that it would be well for the coun-  
 cil to consider the matter of the  
 purchase of a similar machine.

Councillor MacLeod, in connec-  
 tion with the Government Bond,  
 submitted a resolution authorizing  
 the City Surveyor to remove one  
 foot of earth from the surface of  
 Government Pond from the bridge  
 estimated cost of \$600.00 in con-  
 nection with the pumping station, at  
 an estimated cost of \$600.00.

Councillor Holman expressed him-  
 self as in favour of the resolution.  
 Councillor Prowse thought some-  
 thing permanent should be done to  
 put the pond in first class shape.  
 The matter should be considered  
 this fall.

There was some further discus-  
 sion after which the resolution was  
 passed.

A resolution was passed author-  
 izing Councillor MacLeod to ar-  
 range for four or five band concerts  
 at a price of forty or fifty dollars  
 each.

This was moved by Councillor  
 Prowse and seconded by Councillor  
 Kennedy.

It was moved in amendment by  
 Councillor Holman, seconded by  
 Councillor MacLeod, that Coun-  
 cillor MacLeod be empowered to  
 make the best arrangements possi-
