THE DAIRY SITUATION

Sir.—An editorial appeared in your paper yesterday morning evidently echoing the results of a campaign by certain interests to disparage the quality of our dairy products.

Naturally people will say, if the quality of our cheese and butter is deteriorating, would it not be better to let us know it as soon as possible. (That depends on the cause and the steps that should be taken to remove the cause.)

The defects complained of, in my opinion, are practically all mechanical and caused by errors in the process of manufacture, and to a lack of care and thoroughness in the details of finish etc.

Everything is admitted to have been first class up to the last season or two, when some new ideas in the process of making were introduced, and by whom? By the very parties who are condemning the effect of their own blunders, not directly of course, but by laying the blame on the producer. Would it not have been the better way to candidly admit the error, and to return to the former and more successful method?

The time and energy spent in soliciting adverse reports and proclaiming the same to the public, and thus discouraging our dairymen, if spent in encouraging a larger production of milk, would have put on their feet a number of our small and struggling factories.

Besides this, Sir, the quality of our cheese is better than represented. In proof let me cite the following: Last Summer one cheese was taken at random from each of the shipments made by 24 out of the 27 factories for the last half of June, July and August and the first half of September, placed in Cold Storage and taken out at the time of the Provincial Exhibition and scored by Mr. C. H. Barr, Chief of Dairying for Canada. The average of that score was 94.23, the lowest score being 92.82 and the highest 95.80. I doubt if any other group of cheese factories in Canada could make as good a showing.

The Toronto Exhibition has been giving a Silver Medal for any exhibit of cheese scoring 95 points or over and these cheeses are specially selected for exhibition purposes while ours, taken from the general average of the season, made a score of 94.23, or within a fraction of the score required for a silver medal at the largest annual exhibition held on the Continent, and I am satisfied that had we not changed our system of handling the curd, our cheese would all have been eligible for the Silver Medal.
