Colonel Blacklock has had considerable experience in France and has earned a great reputation for organization and executive ability.

SPECIAL MEETING CITY COUN-CIL.—A special meeting of the City Council was held last night for the purpose of considering a revision of the by-laws and taking into consideration a number of matters laid over from previous meetings. The full council was present and good progress was made on the various items which the government will be asked to amend having been disposed of.

A wounded soldier in hospital said to Mr. Greenaway the other day, "You people do buck us up. We are glad to see you come in; it does cheer us." Said another when about to be evacuated, "Brighten up! I do not want to go until I see the Salvation Army Sister, as I do want to thank her for her kindness." The nursing sisters say when our workers go round, "Now, do not forget my ward today, my boys want to see you."

SALVATION ARMY SELF-DENIAL

The annual self-denial work on behalf of the Salvation Army is now taking place. The Salvation Army's work throughout the world is well known, and may be summarized as follows: Countries and Colonies 62; Languages in which we speak 41; Missionaries 2,500; Day schools in heathen lands 647; Hospitals and Dispensaries 128; Women's Industrial Homes 123; Night Schools 33; Children's Homes and Crèches 73; Corps and Outposts 2,635; Officers, Cadets and Employees 23,708; Local Officers (Unpaid) 64,527; Bandmen 28,623; Naval and Military Homes 19; Shelter and Food Depots 280; Beds Supplied to Men and Women 6,888,707; Meals Supplied 14,241,957; Ex-terminals Received (Twelve months) 2,758; Passed Out Satisfactorily 2,577; Social Institutions 1,219; Periodicals Published 75; Copies per Issue 1,286,295.

The following report upon Salvation Army Work has been received at the Toronto Headquarters of the Organization, by Commissioner W. J. Richards. It is written by Lieutenant-Colonel Thos. Greenaway, one of the Army's Officials who are directing these operations: We try to write the Colonel to do what we can to help the boys' not only by providing 'hot drinks', but in a multitude of ways. Whenever we erect a Hut we try to make it 'home away from home'. The human touch is upon all sides of our work, and we seek the aid of the Divine Hand and man's hands to see the way our places are packed out; the whole thing becomes quite a beehive of social and religious agencies. You may see a very large hut where the refreshments are dealt out, simply jammed with a long queue of boys waiting their turn to purchase. The soldier does not want charity, in a smaller hut on one side of this an impromptu concert will be going on, and on the other side there will be rooms full of N.C.O.'s at games, etc. In another very large adjoining you will see about 400 to 500 men at tables, playing games or writing letters home. In the Recreational Hall a Salvation Army meeting will be going on, and in another smaller room, the library, will be the studios at work, or a debating class will be reviewing a book. All the time "the kindly hand" is upon the assembly and advice is being given to many an anxious man about all sorts of things, some of which is relating to his family difficulties and matters of that kind. We do not touch the boys with "the kid glove," or with any patronizing air, but we are one with them. We try to send them away to their awful duties with that kind of influence that stimulates great exploits and daring deeds. Our meetings are wonderful. Our largest huts are jammed to overflowing, not as the result of official parade, but with a vast multitude of voluntary attendants. You will have nearly a thousand men singing the hymns and old songs which turn their thoughts towards God. Better listeners no one need wish for, and reverence pervades the whole atmosphere. Our decision cases number from a few to sometimes 100. The prayer meetings are great. Last night we had over 80 men on their knees seeking God. Think of what this means. Our greatest handicap is the want of workers. It overwhelms one when we remember that in a few hours these men move up to the firing line and the regions of death. The very ablest workers should be sent out. It is a responsible work and an opportunity second to none.
