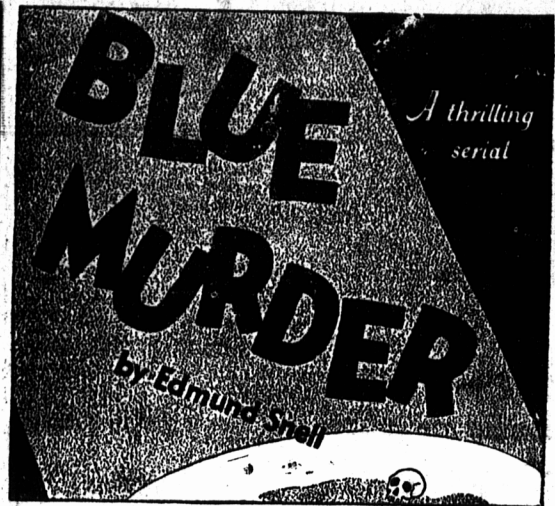

FIELD DAY AT MONTAGUE

An especially well attended Field Day was held yesterday on the Illustration Station at Montague on the farm of Fred McIntyre. Operator. Between 450 and 500 people were present, these coming from far and near and from town and country.

The chief items of interest shown were: The field of summer fallow corn field, check plot running across the entire station; plots comparing manure and fertilizer for potatoes and a potato experiment which was tried at Iona and St. Peters.

The yields of marketable potatoes per acre at Iona were as follows: No potash—18 bushels, 100 lbs.—30 bushels, 200 lbs.—301 bushels, 300 lbs.—312 bushels, 420 lbs.—298 bushels.

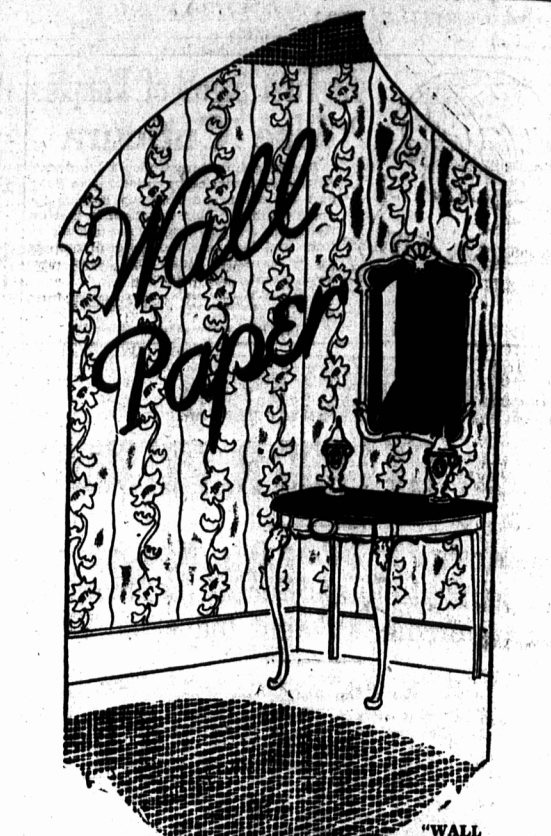

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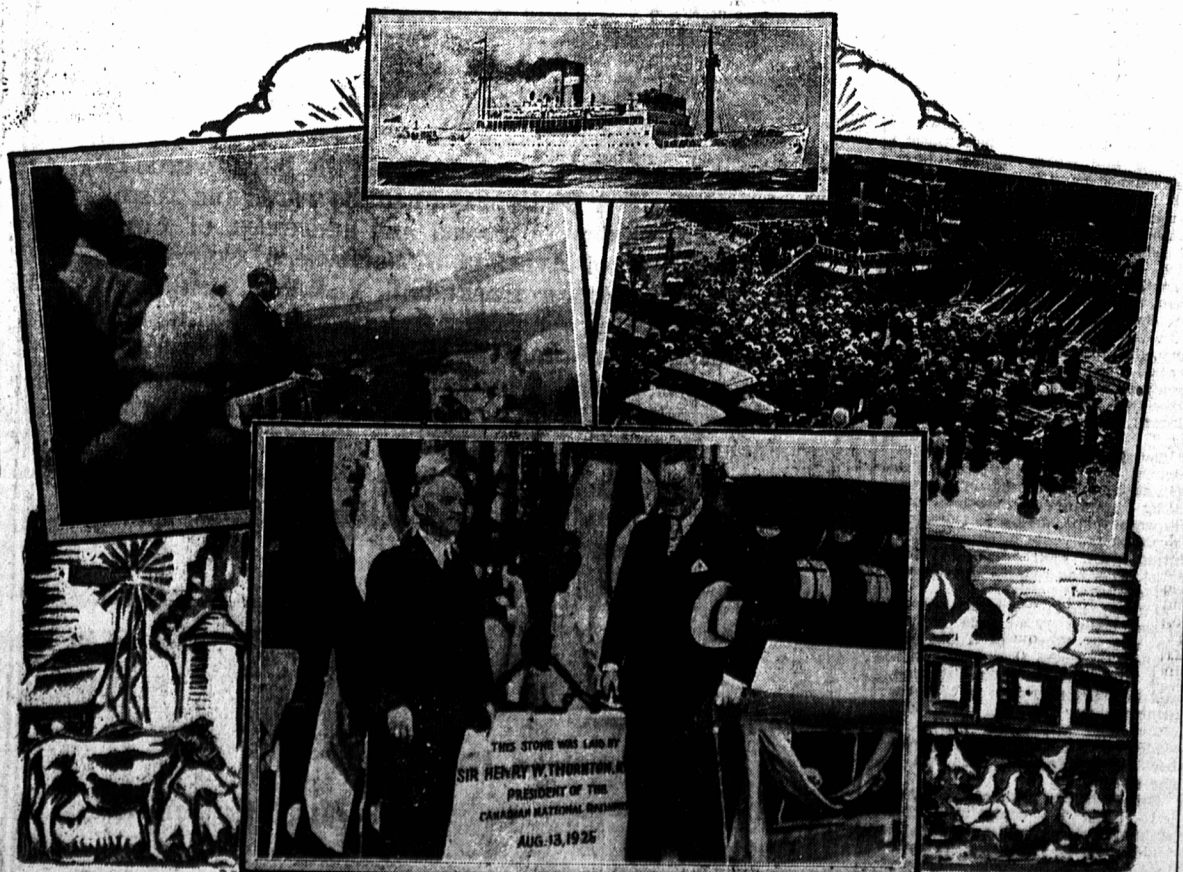
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Laying Corner Stone New Cold Storage Warehouse at Halifax By Sir Henry Thornton, K.B.E., President and Chairman, Canadian National Railways



Sir Henry declared that the provision of this much needed facility was an object lesson to the people of the Maritimes of the value of the joint efforts of the Federal Government, the City of Halifax, private enterprise and the Canadian National Railways. It will assist materially in the marketing and export of the agricultural and other like products of the Maritime Provinces and the rest of Canada particularly in and to the West Indies and Bermuda for which service the Canadian National steamships are providing five new steamers the first of which will go into service the beginning of the coming season.
