LAW AGAINST BEETLES. The "Memoires de la Societe Royal Avandemique de Savoie" give a curious account of proceedings taken against beetles in 1445 and 1487. They had committed great ravages in the St. Julian vineyards. Having listened to counsel on either side, the judge suggested that the vine growers should cede to the defendants land where they could live without tree passing on the vineyards, otherwise he ordered that the vine yards should be respected by the beetles under certain penalties. The beetles have protested that the land was barren, and the court appointed assessors to survey it. They reported favorably, but the beetles raised a legal quibble and so it went on, but what the upshot was is not known owing to the destruction of the document.

 Sexes seldom meet in any form of social intercourse in the islands of Fiji. The boys never flirt with girls, even seem to notice the girls. The public there is a never diminishing distance between them, giving an island an appearance of being a world without love making, and poring primitive life as unromantic as a timid relic.
 Sydney Greenbie, writing in Harper's Magazine, says the native Fijian is extremely timid, but, for all that, none the less fastidious. The care with which he trains and curls his hair would put to shame any impatient husband of the continent. He is particular about his hair without being necessarily girlish in his ways. Curly hair is made by a fine substitute for soap, made of a mixture of burnt coral with water. This is left in the hair for a day or two. When washed out, and dried the hair is curled and combed and anointed. It is excellent from the point of view of sanitation, and makes the Fijian proud of his hair.

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Shot a Big Black Bear Motor Squadrons Of Policemen Will Scour N. Y. Streets

WOLFVILLE, March 2.—A brain affair created considerable interest in Wolfville today when Frank and Merton Millett, of Gasperaux and John Vaughan, of Wolfville, arrived in town with the neck and quarter carcass of a black bear which they shot in Hants County last Thursday. Earlier in the week the Brown brothers reported that while on a lumber expedition in the Black River district they had seen a bear, and as a result the three sportsmen set out with snowshoes and rifles, arriving in the vicinity of Maple Tree Lake on Wednesday. Soon after dinner they located their quarry and had a pot at him, but missed. They followed its tracks for an estimated distance of 25 miles, the devious course into the Forks River District indicating the instinctive cunning of the bear, which repeated would retrace its steps a short distance and then leap off a ledge into a new direction, ultimately selecting a narrow crevice into which it had backed, as there was no room in it to turn. Only its head and neck protruded and rested on a ledge from which it easily could strike any passing prey. It evidently was too weary and footsore to go farther and seemed broken and resigned for the instant. Merton Millett reached the precipice over him and dropped some snow on his snout, but it merely exposed its teeth and snarled. One shot in the neck killed him without a whimper, but it took a second to make doubly sure. It weighed over five hundred pounds and measured over eight feet long. It was an old male in excellent condition but all its four paws had the skin torn off under the claws and were bleeding profusely, so that in every track there was left some blood.
