THE MARKET'S

MONTREAL, Dec. 25.—The receipts of butter for the week ending December 24th, 1920, were 5,394 packages which show an increase of 1,098 packages as compared with the previous week, and an increase of 2,868 packages with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1, 1920, to date show a decrease of 68,645 packages with the corresponding period last year. There was no change in the condition of the market today, but business in all directions was much quieter than usual and of a holiday character, buyers generally having filled their wants early in the week and in consequence the demand was limited, but the tone of the market was steady with round lots of finest creamery of current receipts quoted at 49c. to 51c. per lb.

The receipts of cheese for the week ending December 24th, 1920, were 720 boxes, which show a decrease of 1,148 boxes, as compared with the previous week, and a decrease of 1,988 boxes with the same week last year while the total receipts since May 1st to date show a decrease of 132,172 boxes with the same period in 1919. The volume of business in cheese over the cable of late has been fair which is attributed to the improved condition of the sterling exchange situation and sales are reported to have been made of white goods at 22 1/2 to 23c. per lb and of colored at 23 1/2 to 24c.
