Reviews Conference Failure And Other Problems At Ottawa

The following address will be broadcast this evening from Ottawa by Mr. J. Lester Douglas, M.P. (Liberal) for Quebec.

"The most important item of public interest affecting Canadians at the present time has been the attempt to draw an agreement between the Provinces and the Federal Government over matters of taxation and social services."

"The Conference to bring about an agreement concluded three weeks ago without an agreement being reached. While there is disappointment over the failure to reach an agreement, there was nevertheless, a disposition to study the problem seriously, as witnessed by the fact that the Conference was to meet again in Ottawa on a full week, while a previous attempt was frustrated on the very first day. Moreover, practically every delegate attending the Conference expressed a willingness to return to future conferences and try again. When one recalls that it took two years to complete the Confederation agreement, it may be that more time is necessary to bring about a new agreement."

"The Conference just adjourned dealt with the appointment of the Royal St. Lawrence Commission, and its report made public in 1946. It was followed by the Donkey Conference of December, 1941, which broke up before it got under way."

1942 Agreement
 "It is also well to remember that in 1942 a tax agreement between the Dominion and the Provinces was entered into, and which, in a large measure, similar to what the Federal Government was now proposing insofar as taxation is concerned. The agreement, however, expires this year, and is the reason why Mr. Lester has not been able to draw a budget until he knew the outcome of this Conference."

So far as the recent Conference was concerned, the first step taken toward arriving at an agreement was the appointment of the Royal St. Lawrence Commission, and its report made public in 1946. It was followed by the Donkey Conference of December, 1941, which broke up before it got under way."

The Premiers took these proposals home for study, and reconvened in November and again in January, when certain modifications were made. The last Conference was to seek approval of the proposals on a three-year trial basis.

Federal Proposals
 "I am not going to outline tonight the Federal Government's proposals in the way of additional social services, grants, and so on. I do, however, wish to say a word or two on certain features of the proposed agreement which are of particular importance to Prince Edward Island."

"Everyone knows that the larger Provinces, with their greater industrial development and greater accumulation of wealth, are able to provide from their own resources social services far in excess of those provided by smaller, financially weaker Provinces. The larger Provinces, no doubt, could go along without difficulty; in fact, to even better advantage without the agreement than with it. This, of course, is obvious. But the point is—that the smaller Provinces, and particularly those entitled to expect from the

Cardinal McGuigan Is Presented With Honorary Degree

ANTIGONISH, N.S., May 22—(CP)—James Cardinal McGuigan, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Toronto, and Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia today were presented with honorary Degrees of Laws during colorful convocation ceremonies at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish.

Premier Macdonald urged in his convocation address that all persons take a "close and intelligent" interest in public affairs for the "great problems of this generation" would be problems of Government.

If you should be asked to enter public life, and here I mean political life, I hope that you will find it possible to accept," he said, "in spite of what is sometimes said by critics and scoffers, the profession of politics is not an ignoble one."

Cardinal McGuigan in a brief address stressed the paramount importance of religion and patriotism in the lives of good citizens.

The Cardinal gave solemn pontifical benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at St. Ninian's Cathedral.

Speaks On Livestock

Speaking on the topic, livestock, Mr. Jones gave a brief sketch of his activities in the livestock business and how he had built up his herd of Holstein cattle, some of which are among the best in the world.

He held of forming a co-operative club back in the year 1919 and of purchasing two cars of Holstein cattle from Ontario which he had to raise in building up some of the island herds. He told how, by crossing some of the best strains a valuable herd could be built up.

The Premier called Prince Edward Island an ideal place for breeding cattle, due in part to its position as an island. The Province had been the first in Canada to conduct a test in cattle. In the second test only seven were found, while in some parts of Europe the figure was as high as 20 per cent. Other diseases in cattle here gave very little trouble.

The speaker also referred to what he called the excellent opportunity to build up an export market in cattle here. In the past year the Province exported 8,000 head of cattle to Newfoundland and the United States. He suggested that the Province go into the export of livestock in a big way. The first necessity in building up a good herd, he said, was a competent herdman.

The Premier dealt briefly with artificial breeding, which he said had been proven to be quite practical.

Refers To Education

Referring to education he said he hoped that in the near future the Government would have sufficient money to build high schools where the "lasses" sons and daughters could obtain a practical agricultural education.

Dr. Kinsey was the next speaker. He dealt with the re-organization of the Agricultural Extension of Canada and stressed the necessity of a farm back-

3. A flag composed of red and white triangles bearing a green maple leaf in the centre of the diagonal line separating the two colors, designed by La Ligue du Drapeau National of Quebec; four votes.

4. A white ensign with a red maple leaf in a red circle in the fly and bearing four diagonal blue stripes; designed by J. W. LeRoy, Holman of Summerside, P.E.I.; four votes.
