THE S.S. Bonavista arrived in port at 7 o'clock last evening with a large cargo and a number of passengers. She sails this morning about 11 o'clock with a full deck load of horses, cattle and sheep, also a quantity of oats, potatoes and turnips under deck.

The grief stricken wife arrived at the grave shortly afterwards and when it was explained to her that it was impossible to see the remains she gave evidence of being over whelmed with grief. There were no religious services.

AN Amherst despatch of May 4th says: J. R. Lamy today sold his celebrated trotting mare Rock Farm Grace to J. R. Cowans, manager of the Springhill mines, and Driver Wilcox left with her by this morning's train. Mr. Lamy purchased Rock Farm Grace in Three Rivers, Que. about four years ago, entering her first in the 3 minute class. She has been a winner for the past three years and has lowered the record to 2.30. The price paid is private, but it is supposed to be up in the four figures. She sold at auction as a three-year-old for \$400. Mr. Cowans has now the speediest and most stylish piece of horseflesh in the Maritime Provinces.

Admiral Sir James E. Erskine, who has been appointed first principal naval A. D. C. to the King, in succession to Admiral Sir M. Culme Seymour, has seen forty-three years' service. Sir James has also taken a considerable share of official work. He was private secretary to Lord Northbrook when first lord of the admiralty. He has been a lord commissioner who inquired into the question of French treaty rights in Newfoundland. His service has included the post of commodore of the Australian station, of commander-in-chief on the North American and West Indian station, and of senior officer on the coast of Ireland.—London Leader.

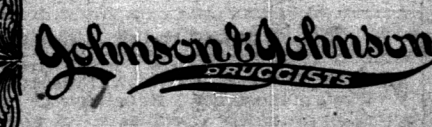
