RUNNING INTO RED

LONDON, Jan. 4.—(AP)—Britain's state-owned transport system is running into the red at the rate of \$50,000 (\$1,550,000) every week, the Transport Commission said today. By the end of 1950—after three years of state ownership—it predicted rising losses will total between \$50,000,000 and \$60,000,000. The Commission, which runs the railways and other state transport services, revealed the staggering bill before a tribunal hearing its application for higher rail freight rates.

GEORGE PALMER PUTNAM DIES

TRONA, Calif., Jan. 4.—(AP)—George Palmer Putnam, publisher-husband of the late Amelia Earhart, died today. Death came to the 63-year-old Putnam, operator of a resort in Death Valley, after four weeks of treatment for uremic poisoning and internal hemorrhages. Miss Earhart, who vanished on a Pacific flight in 1937, was the second of his four wives. Since she was declared legally dead in 1939, he had married twice.
