**Block Purchases Newark Ball Team**

NEWARK, N. J., Sept. 8.—The Greater Newark Baseball Club, Inc., holders of the local franchise in the International League, was sold today at auction to Paul Block, newspaper publisher.

Mr. Block's bid was \$360,000 and he agreed to assume \$147,000 in indebtedness owing local fans who raised the money to aid Charles Davids, former owner, last year. The property includes the club, its players, Davids' Stadium, erected last year, and the league franchise. The Bears have been in financial difficulties since the reorganization of the club, and the purchase of the franchise by Davids last year. The stadium cost more than \$200,000.

The race was mostly fierce to the wire between Ruby P., of the Keyes and Watson stable, a heavy favorite and the unfortunate campaigner, Peter King, of the Reed stable, who rather upset the dope by his fine showing.

Capt. Leggett, a favorite of the Keyes string, took the 2:15 mixed in straight heats and "Vic" Douse made his first track appearance Down East with a winner, Warrant the Great, in the named race, after being thrown off in a spill. The crowd was a record for a second day.
