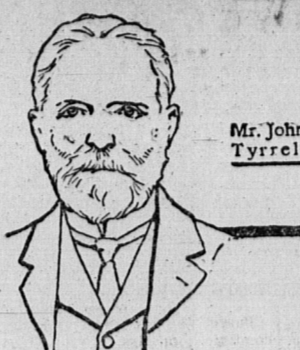

KING'S ADVISORS CHARGE CRIMINAL LIBEL

been freely circulated for years that His Majesty, when Prince of Wales, wasmorganatically married to a daughter of an Admiral at Malta.
The defendant in the case is Edward F. Mylius, who is said to be connected with the paper "The Liberator," published in Paris, which printed the statements on which the libel is based. Mylius was arrested some weeks ago, charged at Bow Street, committed for trial and sent to jail.

In the ordinary way the case would be tried in the Central Criminal Court, but on application of the Crown it will be brought up in the High Court on Wednesday next before Lord Chief Justice Alverstone and a special jury.

According to a statement in "The Liberator," the defendant intends to fight a plea of justification and also to subpoena the King as a witness. The constitutional law, however, makes it impossible for His Majesty to give evidence in his own courts notwithstanding that he may be anxious to do so.

Practically all of the London papers publish stories of the intention of the King's advisors to carry the case to libel.

It is noteworthy that the Morning Post, referring to the arrest of Mylius on December 25 in a recent article, said that he was charged with being concerned in the publication of seditious statements, but the paper made no reference to the alleged morganatic marriage, merely stating that the alleged seditious statements referred, among other things, to the policy followed by this country in Egypt.

The Post also published a long article on the constitutional law in such an unusual case, saying that the police arrested Mylius during a legal vacation and had abstained from charging him in the police court according to the usual procedure. Application was made to the vacation Judge in Chambers, who issued a writ of habeas corpus, and then committed him to custody, fixing bail at \$100,000 which the prisoner was unable to furnish.

The result of this action of the police was that Mylius was legally committed without publicity, and until recently the London papers have made but brief reference to the case. It is understood that proceedings in the suit are being brought under a statute 200 years old.

WORLD MUST RALLY TO SUPPORT OF CHINA

(Continued from page 1.)
America have so informed their Governments, it was learned today.

The blot of death which is spreading through the ever-widening zone of desolation, has already taken a toll extending into thousands, and the blighting scenes have stamped madness upon the minds of countless numbers. Thousands of soldiers are being poured upon the frontier of the stricken district. For the first time China, Japan and Russia have joined in a friendly campaign. These three mighty empires of the East have temporarily set aside their bickerings over territory to link their interests in a great war upon the scourge. However, the Far East practically admits its defeat at the outset. The Powers of the West must lend their aid.

The lives of scores of physicians have been sacrificed in the fight against the spread of the pestilence. Hundreds of soldiers have been sacrificed in the plague zone. Orders have been given to prevent residents of certain sections of Manchuria and China from fleeing, but despite this order, refugees are finding their way into Vladivostok and Shanghai.

Traffic upon the Chinese Eastern Railway is practically dead. The Government has issued orders that no trains, except those running through Imperial concessions, are allowed to cross the frontier. However, trains are allowed to enter Manchuria, and this morning a heavily loaded freight train of ten cars, bearing medical supplies, physicians and troops, departed for the north.

Advices from Kuang-Chang-Tsu, Mukden, Harbin, Fagh-Hua and other towns in Manchuria, state that the plague has made steady headway since China's activity to head it off. The Russians' principal work is done on the northern frontier.

Scores of young medical students in schools in Eastern China have volunteered their services to serve in the plague zone. So far the most of them have been sent only into Chinese provinces, though the next supply will go to Manchuria and will carry detachments of students.

Along the Great Wall conditions are appalling. Travellers from Manchuria, mostly refugees from the scourge zone, carried the disease into China and dozens of hamlets have been wiped out. Men, women and children have fallen and died in the streets of the towns. The air reeks with odors and it is almost certain death to venture into the heart of the stricken territory. Throughout the foothills of the Khiban Mountains the dread disease has spread its direful ravages. The soldiers in many garrisons have fled into the mountains taking refuge at points of high altitude where they think the pestilential germs cannot reach them.

The foreign missionaries are showing great bravery. Not only are they giving spiritual cheer to the Christian Chinese among the stricken, but they are tending material aid as well as nursing and assisting the authorities in cleaning the streets.

This scourge—the greatest in many generations—has been the instrument which will pave the way to many changes in Chinese life. Laws will be enacted to compel families to keep the streets and their home cleaned and general hygienic measures will be adopted. It is impossible even to estimate the thousands that have died so far of the plague. For weeks the average daily death list of Mukden alone has been 175.

DEATH IN GALE.

GLACE BAY, Jan. 31—During the fierce gale and blinding snow storm which passed over this section, three men lost their lives and two horses were drowned in Lunenburg Bay.

Alex McDonald was driving across the beach from Waterford. There was another man in the sleigh with him.

They lost the road in the blinding storm, to find themselves out on the ice about a mile out of their course. When endeavoring to turn the horse back through the ice, and McDonald went down with the horse and sleigh, the other man jumped and landed on the ice but perished,—for when rescue parties arrived nothing could be seen of either man or team.

Near by the same place another man named Starr, was found about an hour later, and was hurried to the nearest house, where he died from exhaustion before medical aid could be secured.

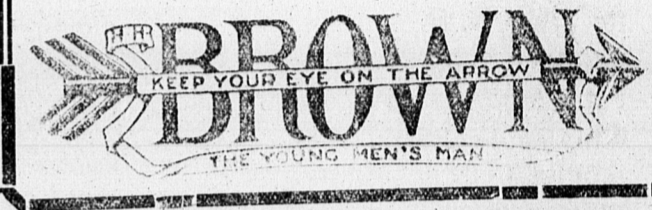
