### Film Records British Pilots Chivalrous Act

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 18.—(C.P.)—A news film record of an act of "enemy" chivalry performed 15 years ago at the funeral of the famous German flying ace, Manfred Von Richthofen, was recently found with the aid of the Swedish Film Industry according to an article in the periodical "Swedish School and Educational Film" edited by the "Svensk Filmindustri", Sweden's leading film company. Baroness von Richthofen, mother of the now almost legendary flying hero, has established a Richthofen Museum to honor the memory of her son. She heard recently that a news film picture had been shown in 1918 in Stockholm, recording how a squadron of British aviators threw flowers from the air during the funeral of their brave adversary. The Baroness wished a copy of this film for her museum and requested the Swedes to do their utmost to find it for her. 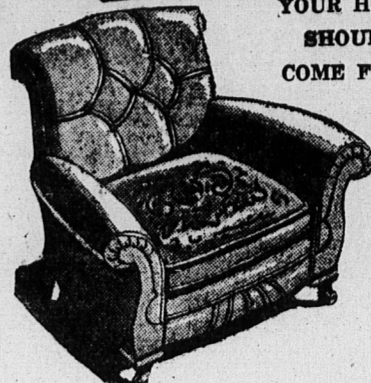

BASE METALS INDICATE GROWTH CANADIAN TRADE MONTREAL, Que. Sept. 20—Among the various business indexes upon which economists base their deductions and prognostications, none occupy a more important place than base metals. Latest figures available in this respect show, comparatively, the tremendous growth which industry has made in Canada during the last decade and they also indicate the low level to which world commerce had dropped, states the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Taking the production of copper, lead and zinc in Canada during the decade 1922 to 1932, Canada increased her production of copper 495.5%, lead 282.9% and zinc 310.1%. Lead mining in Canada is concentrated in one mine at Kimberly, British Columbia, which accounts for 98% of all the lead mined in the Dominion. Nickel, which is a product of the steel-alloy age, exemplifies the extent to which world trade had fallen. Canada exercises practically a monopoly in nickel production and, therefore, Canadian figures can be taken as a gauge in this regard. Comparing the year 1932 with 1929 there has been a decline of 72.4% in production. Comparing the 1932 with the 1931 level, production fell off nearly 54%. With world trade recovery under way, the production of copper, lead, zinc and nickel should show corresponding increases.

### Will Write Play Early Trading Days

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 20—Noteworthy passengers on board "The Muskogee" recently, en route to Churchill over Canadian National rails, were Peter Frenchen of Denmark and Greenland, arctic explorer, trader and author, and C. E. Nelson, scenario writer of Hollywood. Mr. Frenchen is the author of "The Eskimo", a book describing the life and ways of the Eskimo people which has been filmed and will be released within the next couple of months. Mr. Frenchen and Mr. Nelson will gather material for a screen play to be written around the early days of trading in Canada. Their first stop will be at The Pas and, after a few days spent in the northern frontier town, they will proceed to Churchill and later to York Factory and Cumberland House in their search for atmosphere. Moose Factory on James Bay may also be visited.

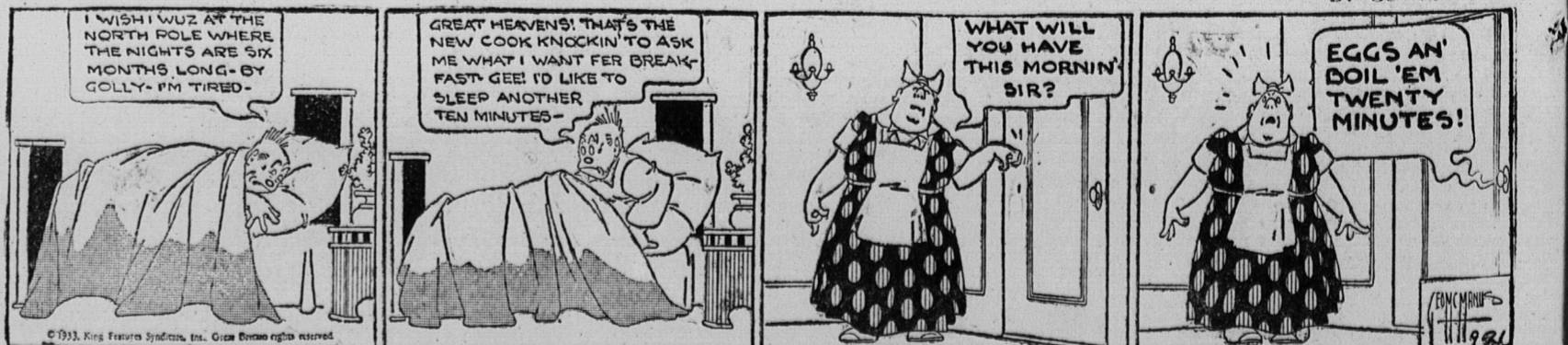
