CARNERA SUES SCHMELING

NEW YORK, April 16—An application by attorneys for Max Schmeling, German heavyweight boxer, for the appointment of a receiver to determine the damages suffered in having vacated a \$25,000 attachment obtained by Primo Carnera, Italian boxer, against Schmeling's property, was denied yesterday by Supreme Court Justice Alfred Frankenthaler.

Carnera is suing Schmeling for \$25,000 for failing to keep an attached agreement to fight him, and claiming the attachment last June, which was vacated by the appellate division when the sheriff reported he could not find any property of Schmeling in this state to attach.

SCHMELING RETURNS TO NEW YORK

German Champion To Start Training For Match With Max Baer In June.

NEW YORK, April 14.—Max Schmeling, former heavyweight boxing champion, arrived here today on the Bremen to start training for his match with Max Baer in the Yankee Stadium June 8.

As always, the young teuton who lost his title to Jack Sharkey last summer, appears in perfect condition and ready to fight on a few days notice. He said he weighed 190 pounds, approximately his best ring weight, and had been training steadily in Germany and aboard ship.

"Germany never has been quieter or more peaceful than today," he said in answer to questions regarding conditions under the Hitler Government. "I saw no cruel treatment of Jews."

His manager, Joe Jacobs, is an Orthodox Jew.

Schmeling, accompanied by his trainer, Max Machon, leaves Sunday for an eight-day exhibition tour that will take him to Montreal, Quebec City, Three Rivers, Que., Pittsburgh, Boston, Portland, Me., Bangor, Me., and Reading, Va. He will start a five-week training siege at Lake Swannanoa, N. J., May 1.

Schmeling would make no definite predictions of the outcome of his match with Baer.

"I'm looking forward to the fight with great confidence," he said. "I plan to stay here this summer in the hopes of getting another match with Sharkey in the fall."

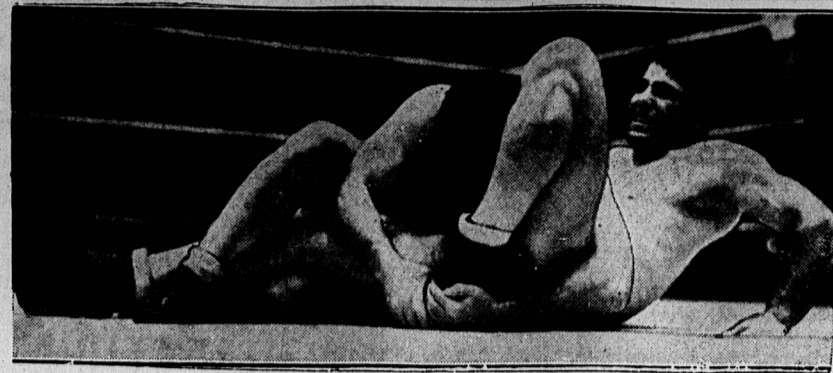

MONTREAL, April 16—Primed to uphold Maritime hopes, Mount Allison University, of Sackville, N. B., arrived here today for the Eastern Canada two-game senior basketball semi-final with Notre Dame de Grace Community Association, of Montreal, here tomorrow and Tuesday.

The Maritime champions who ended a long trail of playoffs with the defeating of Halifax Wanderers last week-end, spent the day resting quietly after their long train journey. Coach Ralph Lister reported all of the team in excellent shape and they will have an opportunity to get their feet on a floor tomorrow morning. They will have a short practice to limber up before tackling the Quebec-Ottawa Valley champions in the evening. The winner of the series will meet Windsor-Walkerville alumni, Ontario titleholders, in Windsor on Friday and Saturday and if necessary on Monday as the Eastern Canada final is a two-out-of-three game series. The Eastern Canada champions will travel to Victoria to meet the Victoria Blue Ribbons in the Dominion finals.

First of the victorious Allan Cup winners, Moncton Hawks, to arrive in Montreal following their win in Vancouver over the Saskatoon Quakers, Bill Miller was greeted like a long-lost brother when he visited the Mount Allison team today. Miller arrived here today with Bert Connolly and the rest of the team will be here tomorrow and Tuesday. They expect to see the Mount Allison squad in action against the Montreals.

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CAR FERRY ACCOUNTING DISCUSSED

At a meeting of the Board of Trade Council Saturday afternoon, the memorandum prepared by the Bureau of Economics, Canadian National Railways, Montreal, classifying the advantages and disadvantages of a change in accounting and management of the car ferry service, was read. Hon. J. A. MacDonald, Cardigan, was present and discussed the subject of change in accounting with the Council. The memorandum had been received by the Minister of Railways, and a copy had been sent to Hon. Mr. MacDonald.

Dr. J. A. Clark presided at the meeting.

It was stated that the Board had not asked for a change in management, but a change in accounting. It would be for the Government of Canada to reimburse the railway for the management.

Hon. Mr. MacDonald stated that there was strong opposition to the change in the person of the minister. He believed that the minister had turned over the brief of the Board of Trade to the consideration of the Bureau.

Members stated that according to the Duncan Commission report the railway was to supply the service and that the Government should finance the project. The Island's contract with the Canadian Government had been completely ignored by the railway.

the streets people stooped in reverence.

A hundred thousand of the devout jammed the Basilica Square to be present at the ceremony. Fifty thousand crowded into the great cathedral for Easter Mass, which the Pope himself said, following a custom not observed since 1870.

The Mass was celebrated first, beginning shortly after 10.30 o'clock, when Plus arrival was announced by uniformed guardsmen blowing long, slender silver trumpets. Papal gendarmes were stationed along the central aisle, down which the pontifical procession marched.

Increase In Grain Shipments

HALIFAX, April 16—Increase in the movement of grain through Halifax in 1933 is strikingly illustrated by the fact that volume of grain shipped to date this year exceeds the total of shipments for 1932.

Figures released tonight by the Halifax harbor commissioners show that 1,709,064 bushels passed through the port from January 1 to April 15; this is an increase of 3,644 bushels over the 1,695,420 bushels shipped from Halifax last year.

Retirement Of Archdeacon

WINNIPEG, April 16—Retirement of Ven. Archdeacon Charles N. P. Jeffrey, from the position of Secretary-Treasurer of the diocese of Rupert's Land, to take effect June 1, was announced yesterday. No successor has been appointed.

A native of Nova Scotia, Archdeacon Jeffrey was educated at Mount Allison University and St. John's College, Winnipeg, and recently completed nearly half a century of service in the ministry.
