The 75th annual prize meeting of the Prince Edward Island Provincial Rifle Association, came to a conclusion early last evening with the presentation of prizes to successful contestants by the President, Lt.-Col. D.A. MacKinnon.

Bernard had been invited and was present at 5 o'clock to carry out the above function, but owing to several shoot-offs to determine the winners of cups closing time was delayed until the Governor having a dinner engagement very regretfully had to take his departure.

Space does not permit a lengthy account of the day's shooting but mention must be made of the outstanding shoot by Major A.P. Gormley in the MacKinnon Match where his two targets and ten on score were built and in a shoot-off with Sgt. Eric Colles of three rounds he scored three bulls. They then had to shoot off for the Army and Navy Cup and ten on score were built and he registered six more bulls making a total of 21 at the 500 yards.

The Grand Aggregate and Ottawa Aggregates carrying the Governor-General's silver medal and the D.C.R.A. medal were won by Cpl. P.J. Landrihan who also won the President's cup for the highest aggregate score. Runner-up to him was Lieut. R.E. Jenkins who worthily maintained the reputation he made as highest scorer in the Inter-Maritime Match at Halifax.

Tommy Spencer Wins Maritime Welter Title

GLACE BAY, N.S., July 29 (AP)—(CP) Robert Spencer, New Waterford, N.S., fighter captured the Maritime welterweight boxing crown at the Miners' Forum here tonight as he won a unanimous 10-round decision over referee, the feature on a four-bout card.

Big League Attendance Figures Up

NEW YORK, July 29—(AP)—The league usually accepted as an accurate barometer of sports prosperity, continue to surge toward a record of some 19,000,000 customers.

With one-third of the season remaining, the unofficial turnstile count from the 16 major league cities shows a grand total of 12,601,100 compared with the record high of 18,974,468 established for a complete season in 1946.

National League totals reveal that 6,356,399 have paid their way into the parks compared with 6,244,711 in the American.

Hughes drawn 1,074,372 and New York Yankees showing the way at 1,455,980 under the impetus of a pennant drive, three teams have topped the 1,000,000-mark. Brooklyn Dodgers have drawn 1,074,372 and New York Giants 1,013,756. Cleveland, Detroit and Boston in the American and St. Louis in the National appear headed for the same select company.

If the Cleveland club continues to pull them through the gates at the same rate during the rest of the year, Bobby Feller's sliding-scale contract probably will earn him more cash than any other player in the history of the game. Hank Greenberg of Pittsburgh is the only possible exception. There is good reason to believe that Hank is right up there around the \$100,000 mark.

The Yankee Stadium crowd continues to amaze the old timers in 39 home dates. The Yankees averaged 37,333 customers. With 30
