JAPANESE DEFEATED.

TOKIO, Nov. 23—In the presence of an enthusiastic crowd of more than 8000 persons, the American baseball team, which came to Japan to play some of the Japanese university teams, opened the season yesterday and defeated Waseda University, 5 to 0.

KAISER READS SPEECH PREPARED FOR HIM

BERLIN, Nov. 23—Emperor William recently made a speech on the occasion of the centennial of the formation of the city council. When he arose to ascend the tribune Prince Von Buelow stepped forward and impressively handed him a printed sheet, and the emperor, ignoring his general custom of speaking extemporaneously, confined his remarks to what was on this paper.

ANGLO-INDIAN OFFICIAL WARNS ENGLAND OF DANGER

LONDON, Nov. 23—The daily record of violence and seditious acts in India has long shown that the unrest there is increasing, rather than abating, and the opinion is becoming general that the situation is growing more serious. One of the latest indications that the trouble is growing is the sudden determination of the Viceroy to cut short a visit he intended to make to the Indian Princes and to return to Calcutta.

Earl of Minto at Lucknow Admits the Danger of the Situation.

LONDON, Nov. 23—The Earl of Minto, Viceroy of India, upon being presented with a loyal address here, said he declined to be persuaded by the seditious in part of India that the time was inopportune for broadening the political basis. He would not admit that the reputation of the whole nation was affected by the fanciful outrages of a section of it. Nevertheless, the existing dangers could not be minimized. They were face to face with an anarchical conspiracy, and special weapons must be forged to deal with the situation. Among the measures contemplated is believed to be the establishment of special courts to deal summarily with outrage mongers.
