Capt. Alfred McLeod, John Delaney, and William McRae, of French River, have returned home from Halifax.

The scholars of the Sunday School in French River held a concert Christmas Eve and although the roads proved unfavorable it was quite a success.

The Christmas tree and entertainments of Higginfield Methodist Church which was to be held on the 30th is postponed till Thursday January 2nd on account of bad weather.

Last week seven men of the Boston Police Department celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of their appointment to the force. Among the seven is Patrolman John A. Gleeson of division 14. He was born in Charlottetown, July 12, 1883. He was made a member of the department Dec. 21 1898 and sent to the Halloway St. station, on Nov. 29, 1898, where he went to the Brighton station, where he still remains. He resides in that district.

The large shipments of smelts and eels which are being sent to the American markets at the present time are being rapidly disposed of. The Charles O. A despatch from Dawson City, tells of activity on Clear Creek, a place where a number of miners from this Province are established. The despatch says:—"More than thirty men are reported working on Clear Creek, a tributary of the Stewart river. The creek promises to become one of the most active producers under the new methods of operation in the Yukon. Twenty of the men on Clear this winter are understood to be working individually on their own claims, and it may be expected they will bring out a number of sleek cakes of gold in the spring or summer. Alexander McDonald, once nominated the king of Klondike, and now one of the most energetic heavy individual operators in the Yukon, was about two hundred claims on Clear and tributaries, and has been doing extensive summer work there. He has several men working on the ground this winter, getting ready for the summer operations. Mr. McDonald is one of the most persistent men in mining enterprises, and promises to make Clear Creek famous. He has his men getting out timber, building cabins and doing other such preparatory work this winter. It was largely because of this big undertaking which Mr. McDonald has on Clear that the new government road was built this fall, at a cost of \$20,000, connecting Dominion creek and Clear, and thus affording a winter highway direct from Clear to Dawson. Miners have been busy on Clear since the earliest days of the Klondike camp, but they did not find it possible to get the pay out profitably in all places. The McDonald scheme contemplates the working of ground by improved methods which was too wet for the old time miner to penetrate, and other ground which the costly primitive methods could not tackle at a profit."
