The widow and five children will be the sole beneficiaries. The Walsh fortune once was estimated at \$27,000,000.

LOGBOOK OF NELSON'S FLAGSHIP IS SOLD.

LONDON, Nov. 9.—The logbook of Nelson's flagship, the Victory, which was announced to be sold at auction at Sotheby's shortly has been bought by T. J. Barrett, an English collector of English relics. Barrett stated that he acquired the logbook for several thousands of pounds. His main object in securing it was to prevent it going to America, the auctioneers having received several cablegrams of collectors offering to purchase it. The chief interest in the book consisted in a vivid account of the battle of Trafalgar, written on the day after the action, which is one of the earliest official records of the battle in existence.

EMPERESS OF BRITAIN WAS IN COLLISION.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 10.—The C.P.R. liner Empress of Britain arrived here this afternoon, after having been in collision with a local steamer off the Irish Sea, near the south-west extremity of the Isle of Man, this morning. The liner was very little damaged, but the other vessel put into harbor in the Isle of Man, in a water-logged condition.

ASTONISHES BANK TELLER.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Wm. E. Brand, a milkman, walked into the Kewanee National Bank of Kewanee, Ill., today and astonished the teller by presenting two large piles of money deposits. All the coins were Lincoln cents, and there were 5462 of them. They were accumulated in two years by Mr. Brand, who resolved to save every Lincoln cent that came to him in change to buy a piano for his daughter.

MISSIONARY TO INDIA DEAD.

BRISTOL, Conn., Nov. 10.—Rev. Henry Mansell, D.D., the first Methodist Episcopal minister in the missionary field in India, and who had fifty-eight years of service there, died here yesterday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. D. C. Monroe. He was seventy-six years old. Death was due to infirmities of old age.

An Ottawa despatch says: The clerk of the crown in chancery has received and compiled the popular vote in all electoral districts of the Dominion, except Winnipeg, Macdonald, Calgary, Edmonton, Red Deer and Yukon, Ontario. Ontario shows a conservative majority of 69,947. The popular majority of the Dominion will be about 37,900 as heretofore estimated. Nova Scotia gave a popular majority of 2,135 and New Brunswick a liberal majority of 5,314. The conservative majority in Prince Edward Island is 640.

A very interesting roll-off took place in the Y. M. C. A. Bowling Alleys Thursday night. Three teams had tied for the championship namely Prowse Bros., "All Stars" and the Railroad. The roll-off took place between Prowse Bros and the Railroad the former making 2232 and the Railroad 2143. It is understood that extradition papers have been secured and that he will be brought to the city immediately. When he arrives here the usual course of procedure will be followed. He will be taken before Magistrate Ritchie in the police court for a preliminary hearing.—St. John Telegraph. (Clark is a native of this province.)

James K. Munnis, one of the best known citizens of Halifax passed away suddenly last evening at his home, 106 Brunswick Street. During the latter part of the week, Mr. Munnis suffered from an attack of acute indigestion, but he recovered sufficiently to be out for a short while yesterday. Last evening he was taken ill again and passed away. Mr. Munnis was born in the North of Ireland, and when quite young he went to Virginia, and from the latter place he came to Halifax in 1865. He founded the tailoring business on Upper Water Street, which is now carried on by his son William. The deceased was eighty-two years of age, and he was remarkably active man for his age. He took a deep interest in all affairs, and he proposed the opening of a new street running from the corner of Argyle and Duke Streets to the corner of Jacob and Brunswick Streets. He was a very strong advocate of the new street. The late Mr. Munnis was an active member of St. John's Presbyterian Church, being a regular attendant at the services since the opening of the church. He was a past master of Keith Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and in politics he was a staunch Conservative. He was the last survivor of a family of fourteen. The deceased leaves four sons and five daughters. The announcement of Mr. Munnis' death will be received with general regret by his many friends, Halifax Exc. (The late Mr. Munnis was well known here, and visited this city during the recent Presbyterian synod.)
