**RE-OPENING.**—The re-opening of the Clyde River Presbyterian Church will take place on Sunday the 25th. At the 11 o'clock the pastor Rev. J. H. McHattie will conduct the services and the 3 Rev. Dr. Fullerton will have charge while Rev. George Orman will take the 7 o'clock service.

**PULPIT SUPPLY.**—The pulpit of Caledonia church which has been vacant for some time was supplied during the holiday season by Mr. Murdoch McLeod, student of Pine Hill Wesleyan College, Halifax. The people were highly pleased with his sermon and join in wishing Mr. McLeod a successful termination to his college course, which ends in April, and best wishes for a long and useful career in his chosen profession. Mr. McLeod is a young man who has few equals as a preacher in the Gaelic as well as in the English language, and Caledonia will be glad to welcome him back at any time.

**ANCIENT PAPERS.**—Rev. William Harrison, D.D., pastor of the Methodist church at Newcastle and contributor of many interesting articles to various papers, has a rare collection of fac-simile copies of old newspapers of two, three and four centuries ago; besides fac-similes of the Magna Charta of the year 1215 and the warrant of execution of Charles I in Cromwell's time. One of the most interesting relics in his possession is a fac-simile of the warrant to execute Mary, Queen of Scots dated 1587. There are also copies of the first English newspaper, also the first newspaper ever printed in America, published in Boston and called the "Boston News-letter" in April 24, 1704. The names of the first English newspaper in Mr. Harrison's possession are "The News," "The Admiralty Gazette," "The Intelligencer," "The English Mercurie" (published by authority) July 23rd, 1538, and several early copies of the London Times. These early papers report for the first time "The Spanish Armada," "The great Plague of London," and London's Great Fire, the arrest and execution of "Guy Fawkes," the death of O. Cromwell, the execution of King Charles I and Louis XVI, the victory, death and burial of Lord Nelson, and the Battle of Waterloo, etc. These unique papers and warrants have a fascination for students of history and others, who have read of the times in which they were first issued, that was a period of history—making indeed, revolutions, executions of Kings and Queens, rise of republics and regencies and the forcing of King John in 1215 to give to the British people the greatest secular blessing that they now enjoy—Constitutional liberty. That was forced from King John about seven hundred years ago. One familiar with history or a reader of historical novels cannot fail to be intensely interested in these unique and valuable papers. Rev. D. Harrison has been a collector of ancient relics for quite a number of years and while still in Charlottetown, where he was pastor of Grace Methodist church for a few years, he had some valuable antiquities that were very interesting.
