LONDON MAN EVER SMOKING

LONDON, Oct. 21—The habits of the average London business man between fifty and sixty are described by Dr. Percival Coke in an article on health that has attracted much attention. "The picture I have drawn," says Dr. Coke, "is not that of a man of vicious habits, but of the average successful and eminently respectable business man. Here is his schedule for the day—He rises at 7.30 and possibly smokes a cigarette while dressing. Breakfast at 8.30. Then he leaves for the city soon after, still smoking. He works hard till one in the afternoon, with various cigarettes. From one to half past two a hearty lunch, followed by cigars, coffee and liqueurs; work till five or half past five, with a short interval for tea, cigarettes at intervals; returns home smoking by train or some other conveyance; a hearty dinner at half past seven, after which he either drowns over a paper or play cards or whines away the evening with some other amusement, smoking all the time and with one or two whiskeys."

LONDON, Oct. 21—Queen Alexandra, who to her intimate friends has been known as an amateur photographer of talent, has decided in the interests of charity, to become an author. Not merely that, but she breaks through the traditions of court custom and has "footnotes" to some one hundred and thirty photographs of an intimate and personal character taken by Her Majesty. EQUAL RIGHTS FOR CATHOLICS

LONDON, October 21—In consequence of the action of Prime Minister Asquith in preventing the carrying of the Host in the procession that brought the recent Eucharistic Congress to a conclusion Lord Talbot, son of the Duke of Norfolk, Conservative member for Sussex, asked Mr. Asquith in the house of commons recently whether the government would introduce legislation repealing such statutory enactments affecting Catholics as placed them in an inferior and disadvantageous position as compared with the members of other religious bodies. The prime minister replied that the government had no present intention of introducing such legislation. It would, however, fully consider any proposals for relieving Roman Catholics from legal disabilities which gave rise to practical grievances. John Redmond said that in consequence of the unsatisfactory nature of the ministerial assurance he would himself introduce a bill.

AN AERIAL LINE TO BE STARTED

BOSTON, October 21—The giving of a contract yesterday for a dirigible balloon to cost about \$7,000, to Captain Thomas S. Baldwin, inventor and builder of the dirigible balloon recently sold to the United States Government, marks the first step taken by the Aerial Navigation Company, of which Charles J. Gidden is the leading spirit since the company was incorporated to operate an aerial freight and passenger line to New York.

The first dirigible is expected to be ready for the opening of the line in May next. The cost of the first stretch including the dirigible and shelters, will be about \$25,000. The dirigible will be patterned after that furnished the Army Department, but with a different frame-work, so as to carry two or more passengers and being capable to carry 550 pounds of freight.

FOUR YACHTSMEN LOST IN THE FOG

NEW YORK, Oct. 21—Hopelessly lost in a dense fog far out near the Sandy Lightship, exhausted and almost overcome by exposure, four Brooklyn men were rescued from a little motor boat late last night. Just in time to save them from being driven out to sea. They were picked up by the steam pilot boat New Jersey given food and warm clothing and with their motor boat in tow, were brought here recently.

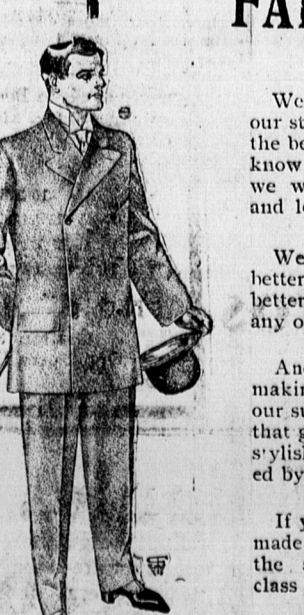
THE VIRGINIAN GOT MIXED UP WITH BUCY.
